## COPPER HIGHER IN NEW YORK AND ABROAD

### ALL METALS LOOKING STRONG—MONTHLY STATEMENT ENCOURAGING.

### SPECULATIVE INTEREST WEAK

### ADVANCES IN COMMODITIES HAD BEEN ANTIICIPATED AND OVER-DISCOUNTED.

NEW YORK, May 10.—There was a falling off in speculative interest and activity in the stock market. Without any pronounced reversal in the tone, operators were less disposed to accept the lead offered by the bidding up of special stocks. Prices reacted more positively in the final dealings.

Improvements in copper was proved by the April statistics of the Copper Producers' association, but the copper industrialists were rather heavier than the general list. It was apparent that last week's speculation in the coppers had been in anticipation of the effect of these figures.

Lending rates for fixed periods were marked up again in the money market. Foreign exchange rates also were firm and still near the gold export level. Total sales, par value, \$5,358,000. United States bonds unchanged.

**ALL METALS HIGHER.**  
NEW YORK, May 10.—London tin was higher today, with spot quoted at \$135.50 and futures at \$134.25, 6d. The local market was quiet but higher, at 29.37 1/2 to 29.75.

Copper advanced to \$59.10 for spot and \$60.50 for futures in London. The local market was firm and a shade higher, with lake quoted at 13.12 1/2 to 13.37 1/2; electrolytic 12.75 to 13; casting 12.62 1/2 to 12.87.

Lead was higher in London at \$13.75, 6d. Locally firm with an advancing tendency, spot being quoted at 4.25 to 4.30.

Silver was lower at \$21.15 in London. Locally quiet but unchanged at 5.02 1/2 to 5.07 1/2.

**GRAINE WEAK.**  
CHICAGO, May 10.—Wheat was weak all day with the exception of a brief period at the start, when a moderately firm tone prevailed owing to

covering by shorts. Offerings were liberal and the market lacked substantial support except on severe breaks. News from foreign markets was also weak, due to a large extent to greatly increased shipments of wheat from Russia to India. At the opening prices were unchanged to 3-8c higher with July at 114 3/8 to 114 5/8 and September at 106 1/4 to 106 5/8.

The low point for July was touched at 112 1/2 and for September at 105 1/4. Final quotations on these deliveries were 112 5/8 to 112 3/4 and 105 1/4 to 105 3/8 respectively.

Although offerings of corn failed to show any increase, the market was weak. July delivery sold between 67 7/8 and 68 5/8c. The close was weak with prices 1-8 to 1-4c and 1-2c below Saturday's final figures, with July at 68 3/8c.

## TWO MILLION IS PRICE OF MISS ISELIN'S TITLE

Immense Marriage Gift Goes to Count Colorado Mansfield with Hand of Beautiful New York Heiress

NEW YORK, May 10.—Two million dollars is reported to be the "dot" that goes with Miss Nora Iselin, whose marriage to Count Colorado Mansfield is announced to take place today at the Iselin country home at New Rochelle.

No elaborate wedding marks this latest union of American dollars and a foreign title. On the contrary, it has seemed to be the desire of the parties most concerned to avoid all publicity in regard to the marriage and the details of the wedding. This extreme reticence is said to be due, in part at least, to the early opposition on the part of C. Oliver Iselin to his daughter's choice of a husband. The well known banker and yachtsman is understood to entertain a strong dislike for international matrimonial alliances, particularly where a member of his own family is concerned. But the determination of his wife and daughter won the day; and after a personal interview with his prospective son-in-law, in which the latter made a most favorable impression, Mr. Iselin gave his consent for the marriage to take place.

Miss Iselin and Count Colorado Mansfield met for the first time last year, when Mr. Iselin and his family were in Rome. They became engaged to be married before Miss Iselin returned to New York, and the marriage would have occurred earlier had not Mr. Iselin been opposed to his daughter's marriage to a foreigner.

The count is secretary of the Austrian embassy at Rome and is said to belong to a highly distinguished family. His mother is the sister of Baron Achrenthal, Austrian minister of foreign affairs, who incited the seizure of Bosnia and Herzegovina, and so threatened the peace of Europe. The family own a castle near Aquileja, which was built in 1302. The head of the house

## IN ELEVEN INNINGS MIAMI BEATS WHITE SOX

### MINERS VICTORS IN HOTTEST BASEBALL GAME OF THE SEASON

### SCORE TIED FOR FIVE INNINGS

### ERRORS IN LAST ACT COST SOX THE GAME BY SCORE OF 2 TO 1

Miami 2, White Sox 1—eleven innings.

Such is the brief story of Sunday's baseball game, one of the best exhibitions of the national pastime ever seen here.

Both teams made plays which, in a big league would have been in the bonehead class, but for an aggregation of players who appear on the diamond anywhere from once a week to once a month, the game was an excellent one. Two costly errors in the last half of the eleventh inning, coupled with a timely single, gave the Miners the game.

The first run was put over by Miami in the second act. Doran went to first on four wide ones, Quinlevan singled to the infield and was out stealing second. Dumatrait was out, McClellan to Ramus, Shirk singled, scoring Doran; Boland was safe on fielder's choice and Shirk was out at the plate.

There was no more scoring until the sixth, when the Sox made their only tally, Pinyon scoring on his own single, Murphy's sacrifice, a walk by McClellan and another single by Redford. The winning run was brought in mainly by a comedy of errors. Quinlevan was safe when Griffin dropped the ball on the third strike and threw wild to first. Dumatrait was safe on fielder's choice and Quinlevan made

second and third on Murphy's wild throw to second. Shirk scored Quinlevan by a timely single to left field.

At several stages of the game it seemed that more runs must be scored, but by good playing by the fielding team and a little loose work by the side at bat, no one was able to reach the home plate safely.

A hot argument came up in the third, when with Bigando on first, Pinyon dropped a hot one into right field. Alt-ries who was handling the indicator, called the ball a foul. The Sox protested and for a time it seemed like there would be a split up in the game.

The scorer was not in a position to see the position of the ball when it lighted, but the umpire was and his word should be taken in the matter. Alt-ries was a little off on balls and strikes, but he gave both sides an even break at that.

Both sides batted freely. Rheinhardt of the Miners was touched for eleven bingles, Pinyon getting three hits out of four times at bat, one of them three-bagger. Murphy and Redford smashed out two each, Bigando, McClellan, Griffin and Collins getting the others.

Collins allowed but eight hits. Shirk grabbed two, with one each by Rheinhardt, Doran, Quinlevan, Dumatrait, Boland and Thatcher.

Two errors were chalked up against the Sox, with three standing against Miami.
