# WELLMAN AND EXPEDITION SOON TO START FOR POLE

## WELLMAN AND PARTY ON WAY TO NORTH COUNTRY

CHRISTIANA, June 23.—Walter Wellman and the other members of the expedition that is to make an attempt to reach the North pole by airship left here today for Tromsø on their way to Spitzbergen, where it is proposed to make the start.

PARIS, June 23.—Walter Wellman and the members of his Arctic expedition are now on their way to Tromsø, Norway, from which point, if conditions are favorable, the start for the north pole will be made within the next few weeks. The mammoth balloon, in which the Arctic voyage is to be made, is already at Tromsø. Several weeks will be required in putting together the frame and adjusting the mechanical parts.

French scientists are greatly interested in the Wellman undertaking. Practically all of the parts of the mammoth airship in which the voyage is to be undertaken were made in Paris. All of the preliminaries have been followed with keen interest here, particularly by the society of aerial navigation.

Expert opinion differs as to the feasibility of reaching the north pole by balloon. Glancing at the precedents for some standard by which to measure the Wellman project, one turns naturally to Andree's ill-fated balloon trip. After some two years of elaborate preparation the start was made on July 11, 1897, from Dane's island, Spitzbergen, with three men or board and provisions for several months. A strong steady wind from the south was blowing—what the party had waited impatiently for since the early summer of the previous year. The balloon sailed away to the northeast and finally out of sight. Four days later a carrier pigeon alighted on the rigging of a sailing vessel near Spitzbergen, bearing the only word that has ever been received from the daring adventurers.

The balloon started in a twenty-five-mile-an-hour wind, blowing in a northerly direction. Had the wind held true at noon the second day out, he should have been 250 miles the other side of the pole, which he would have passed at a distance of perhaps 100 miles on his left. But, according to the message received by the carrier pigeon, he was actually, at noon of the second day, only 145 miles north and forty-five miles east of the point of departure. The probability is that the balloon came down in the ocean to the southeast of Spitzbergen. When he was asked a

few days before his start what would happen if they descended in the sea, the adventurer replied, coolly, that he would "drown," which he probably did. But it should be remembered that Andree's balloon had neither propulsive force of its own nor steering device, except the common guide rope. It was, as Wellman has said, "a mere toy of the winds."

Two problems are uppermost in the Wellman undertaking. First, the vertical stability of his airship, as affected by heat, cold and precipitation, and controlled by guide rope and ballast; second, the possibility of successful anchorage during high winds. A balloon is necessarily a very delicately balanced instrument. A ray of sunshine, a puff of cold or warm wind, a touch of damp mist, causes the balloon to rise or fall. It is most essential in a protracted voyage to keep the balloon at an even height. This the heavy guide rope does. Trailing along the ground or in the sea, it keeps the balloon down, since, when the airship has a tendency to rise, it has to life more and more of the weight of the rope. On the other hand, as the balloon descends, it is relieved of the weight. The guide rope is also of some service in steering the unstable craft.

But there are other factors involved in the problem of vertical stability. The shade and sun temperatures change more or less, the former slightly, the latter in greater measure. There is a certain loss of gas by leakage through the envelope going on constantly, perhaps one to one and a half per cent every twenty-four hours. There may be an accumulation of frost, sleet, or moisture upon the airship amounting to several hundreds of pounds in an hour or two. In operation the motor is consuming fuel at the rate, perhaps, of 800 to 1,000 pounds in twenty-four hours. Or the motor may not be running on account of adverse winds, and yet the other conditions may obtain. That is, the airship may lose a considerable part of its ascensional force through cold and loss of gas at the very time when, instead of dropping weight to correspond through assumption of gasolene, it is actually gaining weight through accumulation of frost and snow. Again, the reverse may be true—a considerable gain of volume and life force at the very time the motors are rapidly reducing the weight of the cargo. Mr. Wellman claims to have discovered the solution of this important and delicate problem in physics. If he has, the possibilities of the success of his daring adventure are greatly increased.

## Soldiers Have Preference in Filing on Reservations

Many of the United Spanish War Veterans of this city are planning to take advantage of the proclamation is issued by President Taft last month when a total of more than a million acres of public land in the reservations of Montana, Idaho and Washington was declared open for settlement and entry. Former soldiers have the privilege of making registration on the lands through an agent, simply by sending the necessary application papers.

Registrations will commence July 15 and close August 5. They must be executed either at Kallspeil or Missoula, Mont., for the Flat Head land; at Spokane for the Spokane land; and at Coeur D'Alene for the lands in the Coeur D'Alene reservation. Applications must be delivered, but not sent by mail, to the superintendent of the opening at Coeur D'Alene, Idaho, which will be the point of drawing for all three reservations.

The drawing will begin at 10 o'clock, August 9, and will continue until completed. April 10, 1910, has been fixed as the time for making entries. This will give the successful applicants opportunity to make personal investigation of the lands, which will be available about June 1. Persons who enter the Flat Head lands will be required to pay one-third of the appraised value, ranging from \$1.25 to \$7 an acre, and purchasers of the Coeur D'Alene and Spokane lands will be required to pay one-fifth of the appraised value at the time of entry, the remainder to be paid in five equal installments. Title can be obtained by five years residence and cultivation, or after fourteen months actual and continuous residence, by the payment of all of the unpaid installments at that time. The lands are suitable for raising small grains, root crops and fruits.
