ARIZONA NEWS AND COMMENT

Marquez, the slayer of P. B. Hodges of Yuma, pleads as his defense that he committed the act in self defense, as he had overheard a plot of Hodges and his companion to murder him to become possessed of a valuable mineral discovery to which Marquez was guiding the party.

Two youthful brothers named Ivanovich are building an airship in Tucson and hope to rival the Wright brothers in the aeronautic field.

After refraining from the services of the barber since last November, Mayor Wentworth is reported to have had his hair cut last week. He vowed last election to have his hair cut no more until Bryan was elected, but finally gave up, realizing that he would have to spend many hot summers with a superfluity of hirsute if he kept his pledge.

It is rumored in Tucson that Councilman Martin will resign at the next meeting of the board of aldermen.

Streams on the ranges of the southern part of the territory are very low and the cattlemen are praying for rain. Stock is suffering severely for lack of water.

Editor W. B. Kelly of the Tucson Star was formally arrested Saturday in Tucson on the charge of criminal libel recently preferred by Mayor Ben Heney, and was later released on his own recognizance. His preliminary hearing will be held at an early date.

Robert Webb has been appointed to the position of stenographer in the office of Surveyor General Ingalls at Phoenix.

The Glendale beet sugar factory is averaging a shipment of a carload of sugar per day.

H. P. Crandall is slated for appointment as county examiner of Yuma county under the provisions of the recent law of the territorial legislature abolishing the office of territorial examiner.

A complete census of the city of Douglas is being taken and it is hoped to show a substantial gain over the population shown by the last census.

The criminal charge preferred by Eugene S. Ives against C. H. Gardner, president of the Four Metals Mining company, of mutilating certain papers of the district court of Cochise county, was dismissed after a hearing by Justice Richey in Tucson.

An aftermath of the capture of Francisco Marquez, murderer of P. B. Hodges, is a squabble over the distribution of the rewards that were offered, amounting to \$1,000. Several have laid claim to the reward money, each one claiming to be the only genuine and original captor of Marquez.

The production of copper in Arizona for the month of May was within a few hundred pounds of the highest point of production, and amounted to 27,319,000 pounds.

Seven Chinamen caught in a Southern Pacific box car in the Yuma yards, and held in custody in that city, have been ordered deported after examination by Immigration Inspector J. B. Shipman.

Twenty-seven additional prisoners were last week transferred from the penitentiary at Yuma to the new territorial prison now being erected at Florence.

The result of the recent school census in Bisbee shows that 2,180 children of school age reside in that city, and the schools report an average attendance of 1,601.

Phoenix newspapers are making big things of the proposed new railroad from the Capital city to Buckeye and predict that in a short time it will be a portion of a new continental line.

Charles Lambert has been appointed sanitary officer for Phoenix.

A card index is being prepared for keeping the records of the First Arizona infantry, and the system will be extended to all Arizona camps of the Arizona National guard.

The Ray Consolidated Copper company last week bought a carload of mules in Phoenix for use in their mining properties in the Kelvin district.

Frederick M. Camp, formerly a post-office inspector in Arizona, died last week at his home in Egypt, N. J.

The Church of the Divine Heart of Jesus was dedicated in Mesa with appropriate exercises Sunday.

Merchants of Tempe have inaugurated a Friday afternoon half-holiday, to be observed during the hot months.

The total tax roll of Yavapai has been filed and shows a valuation of \$9,587,441.91, a falling off from last year of more than a million and a half. The loss is due to the falling off of the mine tax roll.

Attorney General John B. Wright has rendered an opinion to the effect that

the law passed by the last legislature to the effect that the taxation of express, telegraph and telephone companies at the rate of 1 per cent of their gross earnings "in lieu of all other taxes" does not affect city taxes and the corporations will be compelled to pay their city licenses in addition to these taxes.

Awakened to action by the recent disastrous fire in that village, the citizens of Mesa are planning the organization of a fire department.

The jury in the case of Alderman W. N. Edwards of Bisbee, charged with extortion, brought in a verdict of guilty Friday evening. The maximum penalty for the offense is five years in the penitentiary.

Hazel Thomas, one of Bisbee's fairest daughters, has been chosen queen of the carnival in the big Fourth of July celebration in that city.

The Four-Bar ranch in the Sulphur Springs valley has rounded up 10,000 head of cattle and they are being rapidly shipped to the eastern markets.

Construction work will be started in a few days upon the construction of a new and up-to-date theater in Phoenix, to be known as the Majestic. It is to be built by George N. Luhrs and has already been leased by S. A. Echlin for a period of five years.

The territorial fair commission is preparing the grounds for the big fair this fall, and particular attention is being given to the conquering of the dust evil.

Discharged from the territorial penitentiary but a few days ago, John Pennington is again in the toils at Phoenix, charged with robbing a drunken man.

Phoenix citizens are making an effort to induce President Taft to visit the territorial fair during his western tour this fall.

Contracts for prison supplies during the ensuing year have been let by the board of control to the following bidders: Groceries and hardware, Michael Arbilla Mercantile company, Florence; paints, oils, staple supplies, clothing, etc., Florence Commercial company, Florence; leather and findings, Ezra W. Thayer, Phoenix; meat, T. P. Hurley, Phoenix.

Officers in Los Angeles have placed Orlando F. Altorre, a registry clerk, under arrest, on the charge of having stolen \$20,000 which was mailed to the Bank of Bisbee from a Los Angeles bank.

The work of building the levee along the Santa Cruz river to protect the new power station and of widening the river to afford additional safety for the power plant, has been finished.

Leonard Jones, one of the best known residents of Tucson, and an old pioneer of the territory, died Friday at his home at the age of 84 years.

Engineer Sellow of the United States reclamation service has tested the Southern Pacific bridge across the Colorado river at Yuma and reports that it has not suffered from the recent high waters.

The second annual feast of melons will be held at the Yuma theater this evening. Melons galore will be served free of charge to all who will partake.

Yuma county board of supervisors has asked the territorial board of control to levy a tax of 25 cents on the \$100 on the property of Yuma county for the road fund, the proceeds to be used in the construction of a territorial highway from Yuma to Tucson.

Judge Campbell, sitting in the place of Judge Dean in the Cochise county district court, has granted the application of the attorneys of Harry Ducey for a change of venue to Pima county. Ducey was a member of the defunct brokerage firm of Bisbee and has been indicted on a number of charges arising out of the failure of the company.

ORDINANCE No. 78

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT THE OBSTRUCTION OF BROAD STREET IN THE CITY OF GLOBE BY TEAMS, VEHICLES AND ANIMALS, AND TO PROMOTE THE FREE AND UNOBSTRUCTED USE AND TRAVEL OF SAID STREET BY THE PUBLIC.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Globe:

SECTION I.

That from and after the 10th day of July, 1909, it shall be unlawful for any person to allow or permit any hack, wagon, dray, buggy, carriage, cart, gunnolly or other vehicle or any horse

or other animal under his control or in his charge to stop or to stand at any point on Broad Street in the City of Globe between Cottonwood Street and Banker's Garden; Provided, that any such vehicle or animal may be stopped and may stand at the curb on either side of said street and in any block between any two streets intersecting said Broad Street for a period of time not exceeding thirty minutes for the transaction of any legitimate business incident to the use of said street as a public highway, but the standing of unemployed teams, vehicles and animals on said street is prohibited.

SECTION II.

Any person violating the provisions of Section I of this ordinance shall be punished, upon conviction, by a fine not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars, or by imprisonment not exceeding Thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court; and all dray, hack and automobile licenses granted and issued to mobile licenses granted and issued to any person from and after the passage and adoption of this ordinance shall be granted and issued subject to revocation by the Council upon certificate of the Police or City Judge of said City of such conviction, or upon certificate of such Police Court, or other competent appellate Court.

SECTION III.

This Ordinance shall take effect from and after the 10th day of July, 1909.

SECTION IV.

All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
