MEXICAN FINED FOR DEALING MONTE IN MIAMI

Game Taken in on Complaint of Neighbors Who Objected to Noise

Louis Saenz, a Mexican, was convicted of gambling at Miami yesterday and fined \$20.

Saenz was arrested while in the act of dealing a monte game in the bunk house at Miami. Several Mexicans were playing at the time, but all but the dealer managed to make their escape.

When brought to trial, Saenz claimed that he had not been gambling, but that he had merely dropped into the place to secure some information regarding a friend.

He denied having seen any money on the table at the time of the arrest. After he had been convicted, however, he asked Assistant District Attorney Weinberger, who prosecuted the case, to return the money to him.

The money was not returned, as Saenz did not press the question of its ownership, when he learned that he might be arrested for perjury.

Complaints of other occupants at the bunk house, who objected to the noise made by the gamblers, caused the officers to make the raid on the game and arrest the dealer.

Saenz paid his fine and was released.

ENGINEERS NAMED FOR CORRECTION OF STREET

Original Lines of Broad Street in North Globe to Be Restored

For the purpose of making a new survey with the intention of widening North Broad street at its intersection with Bone street, a point which is now obstructed by property improvements, Engineers Ed. Stewart, Howard Wayne and George Andrus have been named.

Not all of these engineers have accepted the appointment, but it is probable that all will serve.

At the present time, a brick structure, generally known as the Acme Saloon building, occupied by the One Horse Shoe Rooming house and a Chinese restaurant, and a frame building occupied by the Eagle saloon, as said to project upon the street.

If the contentions of the street committee of the city council are borne out by the survey, it is probable that both buildings will have to be either moved or altered.

It is said that the jog in the street comes as the result of the action of the officials of Globe in allowing an old fence to obstruct the street before the city was incorporated and later in permitting the erection of buildings along the line of this fence, which encroached upon the street.

Broad street is very narrow at this point and numerous complaints brought the matter to the attention of the present street committee.

KELLNER TO VISIT COUNTY SCHOOLS

On Reports from Country He Expects to Find More Pupils than Ever

W. O. Kellner, county superintendent of schools will begin an inspection of the schools of this county today, which, when completed, will take in all of the educational institutions of the county, which have not already been inspected this year.

Today Mr. Kellner will visit the Live Oak and Warrior schools. Tomorrow he will visit Copper Hill.

Friday morning he will leave on a ten-day trip into the northern part of the county. On this trip he will visit nearly a dozen schools.

Unofficial reports which have been coming in from the different schools of the county indicate quite a considerable increase in attendance over last year and Mr. Kellner expects to find all of the schools in a flourishing condition.

FIRE APPARATUS IS DELAYED

Strike in Factory Will Delay the Delivery of Chemical Engine

As the result of a strike at the factory of the Robinson Fire Apparatus company of St. Louis, the delivery of the new chemical engine which has been ordered by this city will be delayed for at least a month, according to advices received by City Clerk Welch yesterday.

According to the contract of the city with the manufacturers, the new machine was to have been shipped on October 10. As it can hardly be shipped before the middle of November, it is not likely that the new chemical engine will arrive here before December first.

Owing to the delay in letting a contract for the erection of the new fire house, the non-arrival of the chemical engine will not work any particular hardship on the city.

Contractor R. W. Grabe will complete the erection of that building by the first of the year and by the time the new machine arrives, the building should be far enough along in course of construction to permit the housing of the apparatus.

The old fire house has been demolished and removed from the city hall lot and it is expected that Contractor Grabe will begin the work of erecting the new building within a short time.
