

SUFFRAGETTE BOSS IN NEW YORK

Mrs. Pankhurst Don't Believe Women Could Hurt Politics

NEW YORK, October 21.—A quiet group of New York women, bearing banners labeled "Vote for Women," stood on the White Star line pier tonight and welcomed to America Mrs. Emmeline Gould Pankhurst, leader of the militant suffragettes of Great Britain.

She was hurried to the suffrage headquarters at 502 Fifth avenue.

"I am coming to America," she said, "to speak on the subject of equal rights for women, and to study the situation in this country. I think we are away ahead of you in this matter."

"Don't you think there would be corrupt women politicians and woman ward healers?" Mrs. Pankhurst was asked.

"Well," she replied, "I don't think it would make politics any worse, at any rate."

She will remain in the United States until November 22, but will not be able to get as far west as Colorado, where woman suffrage prevails.

SALINA, Kansas, October 21.—A rare opportunity for any person desiring to own a town was afforded today, when the village of Shipton, nine miles from here, on the Union Pacific railroad was put up for sale at auction. The village is a lively little place with a railroad depot, a grain elevator, half a dozen stores, postoffice, churches, dwellings and all of the other accompaniments of an up-to-date community.

As the advertisement reads, the owner has good reasons for desiring to sell. The entire village is located on the big wheat ranch of W. S. Irwin, who has made so much money that he is going to retire. As an inducement to prospective purchasers Mr. Irwin offers to throw in his farm machinery and a few acres of his wheat farm to anyone who will buy the village.

CONSERVATIONISTS MEET NEXT MONTH

Will Gather in New Orleans for Purpose of Putting Principles of Hobby into Effect

WASHINGTON, October 21.—Leaders in the conservation movement from all parts of the country will gather at New Orleans November 1, when the first steps will be taken toward putting the principles of conservation into effect.

The occasion will be a conference of the chairmen of state conservation commissions. The governors and the chairmen of conservation commissions of fourteen states, Chief Forester Pinchot, J. B. White, chairman of the executive committee of the National Conservation congress, and others will participate.

OHIO MEN ORGANIZE TO PROMOTE FLYING

Capitalists of Cleveland Interested in Aeroplane Work Will Build Sheds for Machines

CLEVELAND, October 21.—At a meeting of capitalists today it was decided to organize the Cleveland Aero club. The organization was promoted by Glenn H. Curtiss the aeroplane man, who has been here for several days.

It is proposed to purchase land and erect sheds. It is not intended to manufacture flying machines, but only to experiment with them and promote the art of flying.

ST. COOK WOULD HELP TO CLIMB M'KINLEY

ANN ARBOR, October 21.—Dr. Cook the arctic explorer, who lectured here tonight before a large audience of students at the University of Michigan, said he was delighted to hear of the offer made by Chancellor Strong of the University of Kansas to send Professor L. L. Dyche to scale Mount McKinley.

FEDERATION WOULD REDUCE ACCIDENTS

President Gompers and Associates at Work on Plan to Provide More Safety Appliances

WASHINGTON, October 21.—For the protection of workers who are required by their occupation to handle machinery, the installation of modern devices that will render accidents practically impossible is one of the problems now being worked out by President Gompers and his associates in the executive council of the American Federation of Labor.

The council today agreed to study the question and it is likely that the convention next month will be urged to take steps to this end.

Resolutions were adopted urging national legislation for the establishment of postal savings banks and a parcel post.

POSTMASTER OF WASHINGTON DEAD

Had This Day Been Admitted to Practice Before Supreme Court in District of Columbia

WASHINGTON, October 21.—Benjamin W. Barnes the postmaster of this city, and who served first as executive clerk under President McKinley and later as assistant secretary under President Roosevelt, dropped dead here tonight of heart failure. Mr. Barnes had been in particularly good humor today over the fact that he was yesterday admitted to practice before the supreme court in the District of Columbia.

RECORD BREAKING CROWDS REGISTER

ABERDEEN, S. D., October 21.—All records for registration crowds will be broken today at the opening of the Cheyenne River and Standing Rock Indian lands, when 6,265 persons appeared before notaries at six points and filed applications.

This is the final week of registration. The grand total is now 62,208.

M'CARREN BETTER

NEW YORK, October 21.—McCarren, lying ill at St. Catherine's hospital in Brooklyn, is deposed from the democratic leadership of that borough, according to a report tonight. Anti-McCarren borough tickets were withdrawn from the Brooklyn field today with the understanding, according to rumor that they were to cause the fight against McCarren on consideration of his being ousted.

EUROPEAN WRESTLER WINS FROM ALBERG

KANSAS CITY, October 21.—In two straight falls Zybako, champion wrestler of Europe, won his match from Earl Alberg, the French champion, here tonight. It was announced that he thereby earned the right to meet Frank Gotch, champion of the world.

ROMERO GUILTY IN FIRST DEGREE

NOGALES, October 21.—The jury in the trial of Casimiro Romero, indicted for the murder of Edward Egan last June, this evening rendered a unanimous verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree and imposed a life sentence. The trial lasted three days.

RENO, October 21.—About fifty Chinese secreted in a box car bound to New York were arrested here today. They had provisions enough to last two weeks.
