BIRTHDAY OF KING CELEBRATED IN ENGLAND

Congratulations and Demonstrations Mark 68th Anniversary

LONDON, Nov. 9.—"Edward VII., by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions Beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India," reached his sixty-eighth birthday today. His Majesty passed the day quietly with his children and grandchildren, the latter vying with each other in their expressions of fondness for their beloved "grandpa."

From early morning congratulations poured in upon the King from all parts of the world, and presents arrived throughout the day from royal and distinguished personages. Nearly 2,000 messages were received including a very cordial one from the German Emperor. To each one a cordial acknowledgment was sent, many of them in the King's autograph.

The London salute of forty-one guns in honor of the King's birthday was fired at noon in St. James's Park. The Union Jack was flown, and the several foreign embassies and legations hoisted their distinctive flags. The anniversary was observed at Windsor by the ringing of the bells at St. George's chapel and the parish church. The public buildings were decorated, and a salute was fired in the Long Walk.

DESIRE TO INSTALL SHIPS ON LAKE ROOSEVELT

Mining Men Confer With Reclamation Officials on New Project

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 9.—While at Roosevelt recently, James Purtha of Pittsburg, secretary and treasurer of the Tonto River Copper company, and J. P. Bosh, a Globe business man, conferred with the reclamation officials, seeking information about the area of basin that will be navigable for water craft when the water is impounded by the dam. The result of their inquiries shows that it will be possible to load freight and passengers at Lewis store on the Salt River and land them at Cline on the Tonto a distance of about twenty seven miles, which will cut off over thirty miles of bad haul over bad roads and should cut the freight rate one-half besides saving some twenty four hours in time hauling freight from Mesa to the Tonto and Payson districts. The Tonto River Copper company is perfecting plans to build a launch and a small fleet of lighters or flat bottom boats and to put on a small stern wheel steamer or gasoline line motor boat to take care of their own business. They have also brought to the attention of the board of trade in Globe who will be asked to take an active interest in the project.
