TRADING INERT AND STAGNATION IN EVIDENCE

Sales Yesterday Fall to Insignificant Figure—Confined to Regulars

NEW YORK, February 23.—The stagnant and inert stock market is suggestive of waiting for the development of new forces. Room traders labored to move prices and turn small fractional profits at the expense of each other. Sales fell to a figure lower than for a year and there were long intervals when nothing was done on the floor of the stock exchange.

BUTTE IS RESUMING

Operations Begun on Bigger Clark Mines and Butte Smelting Plant

BUTTE, February 23.—Operations were resumed today on the Original and West Stewart mines, chief of the Clark properties, and the Butte Reduction works, supplied from those properties, will be running full blast, it is thought, within a few days. The Diamond and High Ore mines, among the large holdings of the Anaconda company, will resume operations this evening. Matt Comerford, president of the International Stationary Engineers' union, arrived today and is in conference with the local union, whose members walked out last week.

CONDUCTOR OUT OF PRISON IN MEXICO

Release on Bond Equivalent to His Discharge

FORT SCOTT, Kans., February 23.—J. A. Cook, the American railway conductor who has been in jail at Guadalupe, Mexico, for six months, was released today, giving \$2,000 bond, which was furnished by the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors of America. His release was taken here as the equivalent of dismissal of the charges against him.

PERCY ELECTED AS MISSISSIPPI SENATOR

JACKSON, Miss., February 23.—The two houses of the Mississippi legislature, in joint session, today unanimously elected Leroy Percy as United States senator to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator McLaurin, which expires March 4, 1913.

TO SUPPLY INDIANS WITH MORE LANDS

Senate Bill Gives Redskins Same Rights as Whites

WASHINGTON, February 23.—The senate today passed a bill allowing allotment of lands in forest reservations to Indians in case of exhaustion of their reservations. Senator Heyburn argued that the bill would give the Indians preference over white men, but Senator Clapp called attention to the fact that the whites had this right.

MILLION SAVED FOR EDUCATION

Attorney General Will Have Charge of Stokes Fund

NEW YORK, February 23.—An agreement among the heirs, approved by Supreme Court Justice Gerard today, saves for the purpose intended by the testator the sum of \$1,000,000, bequeathed by the late Mrs. Caroline Phelps Stokes for the education of whites, negroes and Indians. The attorney general of the state becomes custodian of the trust fund.

HARRY THAW DON'T RELISH MATTEAWAN

Asks Removal to Another State Institution

FISHKILLE LANDING, N. Y., February 23.—Whether Harry K. Thaw shall continue an inmate of the Matteawan asylum for the criminal insane or be removed to some other state institution will be determined at a hearing begun today. In making his application for a transfer to some other institution Thaw declared that his privileges were curtailed at Matteawan, that he was not permitted to have what he wanted to eat and that he was constantly obliged to associate with dangerous lunatics.

KIRKSVILLE, Mo., February 23.—A warrant charging Dr. J. R. Hull of Mauro City with murdering Professor J. F. Vaughn by strychnine poisoning was issued tonight at the request of Prosecutor Reiger.

LETS OUT SIXTEEN IN BREAKING JAIL

HOT SPRINGS, February 23.—C. A. Conlin, wanted in San Francisco for larceny, escaped from jail tonight, releasing sixteen prisoners. He left in an automobile. A posse is in pursuit.

ALLEGED CHINESE SMUGGLER PINCHED

WILLIAMS, Ariz., February 23.—John Oliver, an alleged smuggler of Chinese, was arrested at the request of the Los Angeles immigration office and brought here today from Ash Fork to await the arrival of a United States marshal. Deputy Matanz captured Oliver, but the prisoner got away and was retaken and brought here by Immigration Officer Thies.


NO AGREEMENT AS TO PLACE OF FIGHT


Philanthropist Giving Away His Last Million; Other Men Who Figure in the News.

EMPEROR WILLIAM

By April 14, his ninetieth birthday, Daniel K. Pearsons expects to have given away his last million. He is the famous Chicago philanthropist who has donated over \$1,000,000 to colleges and charities.

One of Emperor William's most highly prized possessions is a large oil painting of himself by Philip Laszlo, a Hungarian artist. He has just sent a large photograph of the painting, with his autograph, to Herman Ridder, the New York publisher, who was acting president of the Hudson-Fulton celebration.

Yahan Nalbandian, alias Frank Jones, an Armenian, is under arrest in Fucharest, Bulgaria, on suspicion of having murdered Minas Nonjian, a countryman, in Lynn, Mass., last July. Nalbandian will be extradited.

Patrick Calhoun, called upon to face trial again in San Francisco on a charge of bribery of public officials in connection with a street railway franchise, is one of the most prominent of America's lawyers and street railway men. The jury disagreed after his first trial. He is a grandson of John C. Calhoun, the famous statesman.
