Stray Topics from Little Old New York

NEW YORK, February 26.—What is the use of worrying over the high cost of living, the greed of trusts, the corruption of politicians, poor health and equally poor business, when everybody, by a simple trick, can be happy and attain everything he or she may wish? The problem of perpetual happiness has been solved at last and Mrs. Julia Seton Sears has done it. She is a priestess of THE NEW THOUGHT and those who had the opportunity to hear her at the New Thought Matinee at the Belasco theater the other afternoon were surprised when she explained to them how easy it is to be perfectly happy. Why, any child can do it. All you have to do is to close your eyes, breathe deeply and concentrate your mind upon whatever you wish, be it health, wealth or a new automobile. If you keep it up long enough you are sure to get all you wish, perhaps even more. There were several hundred men and women in the audience at Mrs. Sears' matinee and all of them shut their eyes, breathed deeply and, presumably, concentrated their thoughts upon their individual pet wishes. This period of New Thought exercise lasted about fifteen minutes, and if the people in the audience did not get what they wished for it is merely due to the fact that they did not keep up their deep breathing and concentration long enough to "bring their vibrations in harmony with their aura" whatever that may mean. Mrs. Sears says she knows, but for some reason or

other she won't tell, or at least not so that other persons can understand it. A jury in Supreme Court Justice Mareau's court got itself into serious trouble the other day by discharging itself in the most nonchalant manner. The jury had been sitting all forenoon and part of the afternoon in a suit over a contract. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon the jury retired and three hours later they informed the court officer in charge of them that they had "agreed," and handed him a "sealed verdict." As customary in such cases the jurors were then permitted to go home. The following morning the jurors were all present at the opening of the court and the foreman handed to the judge the sealed verdict. On opening the document the judge was astounded to behold the words: "Jury unable to agree." Then the court proceeded to say things to the jurors who had "agreed to disagree" because they wanted to get home for their supper. Justice Mareau ordered the jurors to appear before him next Monday to show cause why they should not be punished for contempt of court.

The principal of one of the Manhattan schools was fined \$500 the other day by the elementary schools committee of the board of education for holding two positions and neglecting his school duties. It appeared that the principal referred to for the last two

or three years had served not only as principal of his school, with a salary of \$3,500 a year, but had also served as a condemnation commissioner for the city, in which capacity he drew a salary of \$7,530 a year. It was found that the versatile "educator" had attended 1,800 meetings of the condemnation commission on school days, nearly 100 of which occurred between 9 and 12 o'clock and 1 and 3 o'clock, and to attend them he had to leave his school, thereby neglecting his duties. Considering the fact that by thus doubling up the man earned more than \$11,000 a year, it may be readily seen that he can well afford to pay a fine of \$500 every year and continue to hold both positions, without paying any more attention to his school duties than heretofore. And yet there are some people who fondly imagine that "pull" counts for naught with the board of education.

An enterprising New York correspondent sent out a story the other day which deserves a place of honor among the boldest canards that ever found their way from the metropolis into the columns of unsophisticated country newspapers. The yarn was of a woman with a mole in her chest. According to the writer, who is either a powerful bidder for membership in the Ananias club or for a padded cell in Bellevue hospital, the woman swallowed the mole when it was very young, without knowing that she had done so. The animal continued to live and thrive and, finding the stomach too close quarters, made its way into the woman's chest, where it continued to live for several years. Later, only lately, so the correspondent stated, the presence of the full grown mole in her chest caused some slight inconvenience to the woman and she consulted a doctor. The learned disciple of Aesculapius at once diagnosed the case as "mole-itis" and promptly

amputated or otherwise surgically removed the mole, to the utmost relief of the mole-ridden patient. She is doing well now, thank you.

Whether it is a secret of news owing to the absence from the United States of Theodore Roosevelt, or some other reason, that prompts correspondents to send out similar yarns, is difficult to determine. Usually these yarns make their appearance in print simultaneously with sea serpent stories during the broiling "dog days," but this year they are coming, like Easter, a little ahead of time. Another capital yarn was that sent out by an Ithaca correspondent, saying that experiments at the poultry department of the New York State College of Agriculture had proven that by feeding certain dyestuffs to hens during their moulting season not only their feathers but also their eggs may be given any color desired. However, the color of the eggs always matches that of the plumage. In the future the tedious and often unsatisfactory task of dyeing Easter eggs may be entirely dispensed with. The hens may be made to lay eggs of any desired color. Just think, what a brilliant display hens will make at poultry shows of the future!

The vagaries of diseased minds are unaccountable, indeed. There are scores of patients in various lunatic asylums who imagine themselves to be Napoleon, St. Peter or John D. Rockefeller, but it was left to a woman in this city to establish a new record of lunacy. The woman is wealthy and, although as thin as the proverbial rail, is laboring under the delusion that she is too fat.
