JUDGES OF THE HIGH COURT.—C. P. Smith beats Judge Thatcher 1556 votes.

CHOLERA.—It is rumored here that the cholera is in Memphis again. Is it so? We see nothing of it in the city papers.

Next week we intend to give the vote of this county by precincts, for future reference. We hope also to give the vote for governor in all the counties of the state, if we can get the complete returns by that time. Gen. Quitman's majority will be upwards of 10,000, we think.

CONGRESSIONAL ELECTIONS.—Jacob Thompson's majority over Major Bradford is 2357; in the 2d district, Col. Featherston's majority over Wm. H. Harris, Esq. is about 1000; in the third district, McWillie's majority over Gray, 877; and in the 4th district, Brown's majority over Winans, 4160. The returns from the second district are not complete, lacking Bolivar county. Leaving our Bolivar, Featherston's majority is 1087.

We intended to have published the appointments of the Conference this week, but have not been able to get a copy. Why did not some member of the Conference hand them to us? A resolution was passed, we thought, requesting their publication in the papers of this place.

THE DEMOCRATIC TEXT BOOK.—We received from the accomplished editor of the Aberdeen Independent, just before the election, a very valuable document with the above title, which, we learn, was compiled by him and Wm. Municipal—Pacific Rail-road.

Whereas, A public meeting of the people of this city passed a Resolution receiving and approving the following plan of Captain Albert Pike, of the State of Arkansas, for a Rail Road connection between the Mississippi river and the Atlantic coast.

Resolved, That this council highly approve the plan proposed by Capt. Pike, and hereto annexed, as entitled to public favor, and the serious and patriotic consideration of the assembled wisdom of the Nation, now at the Federal seat of Government, in the capacity of Representatives and Senators in Congress. Be it

Resolved, That five delegates be deputed by this Council to present the proposed plan to the General Assembly of Tennessee, asking its countenance and sanction thereon the more promptly to ensure the attention of Congress.

Resolved, That these resolutions and the accompanying plan presented by Capt. A. Pike, be printed in the press of the City, and the same be kept standing in each for the space of one week and published in at least two weekly editions of each paper.

Extract from the minutes of the proceedings of the board of Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Memphis, November 21st, 1849.

E. BANKS, Mayor. A. L. RICHARDS, Recorder.

To the Hon. the Senate and House of Representatives of the U. States of America, in Congress.

Your Petitioners, Citizens of the State of Tennessee, respectfully pray: That the Congress enact, that there be appropriated whatever amount of moneys may be necessary for the purpose of building a Rail Road from the Mississippi River to the Pacific Ocean, to be raised by laws secured by pledge of the proceeds of the public Lands of the United States.

That it be enacted, That said Road consist of two branches, commenced at one time and carried on simultaneously—one from Memphis or some other proper point in the Southern States on the Mississippi, connected or to be connected by Rail Road with the Southern Atlantic Cities, and one from St. Louis or some other proper point in the Northern States on the Mississippi, connected or to be connected by Rail Road, with the Northern Atlantic Cities—united at some proper point west of Mississippi or Arkansas, and thence running by a single line by the best practicable route, which shall afford equal facilities and equal advantages to the Northern and Southern Atlantic Cities, to such point on the Pacific Ocean in California as shall be most eligible in respect to commerce and the interests of the different sections of the Union.

That it be also enacted: That such Road be built and put in operation, and bridges erected over the Mississippi at the termini with the funds of the General Government, at the earliest practicable period.

That it also be enacted: That from the passage of such law, all moneys thereafter payable to any of the States under present or future laws, out of the proceeds of the Public Lands, be retained by the Treasury of the United States, and thereon placed to the credit of such respective States; and also that a certain per centum of the future proceeds of the Public Lands be in like manner retained, to the credit of each State and Territory in the Union, until such Rail Road be completed, and in operation, and that the whole residue of such proceeds be pledged, and irrevocably devoted to building such Road, or repaying the moneys obtained on loans for the purpose of building the same.

That it be also enacted, That if other branches of such Road are at any time built from other points on the Mississippi, the Lakes, or the Gulf of Mexico—one from a point in the Northern States, and one from a point in the Southern States shall always be commenced and carried forward simultaneously, and such new branches, whether built by the General Government, or out of the proceeds of the Road, shall be sold first to such new States as may have no share in the road, and any residue may be purchased by other States, Cities, Corporations or individuals and that lateral Roads may be built to any necessary points, out of the proceeds of such Road, when the Board of Direction deem it expedient.

That it be enacted: That the troops, militias of War, and the Mails of the United States shall at all times be conveyed on such Road without charge, and that the rates of freight and passage on such Road shall be always regulated by Congress, which shall also through all time, exercise a supervision over the acts of such Board of Direction.

Foreign News.

ARRIVAL OF THE CALEDONIA.

Boston, Nov. 25—11 p. m. Caledonia just arrived. Cotton was in active demand the day previous to her sailing and prices had advanced one eighth to one fourth penny on American descriptions. Her political news not important. The new ministers to the court from England had sailed from Portsmouth on the steamer Panani. It is understood his first business on his arrival will be to know what encouragement if any, the United States give to the attempted withdrawal of the Canadas from British rule.

It is said the British Government has intimated that it will use no coercive measures to prevent annexation to the United States, if the popular voice be decisively expressed in favor of it. It is understood the Minister has full power to resist energetically all interference of the United States in Nicaraguan affairs.

Austria.—Three additional executions, Haynan has published an amnesty.

The Turkish government has been informed by Count Desselrode that the Czar demands that the Hungarian refugees shall be located in the interior of Candia, or such part of the British territories as may afford the best chance of keeping them under surveillance. Bem denies his final conversion to Islamism.—Private letters from Constantinople of Oct. 26th, announce the arrival of a British fleet at the mouth of the Dardanelles.—The Sultan and his ministers are greatly pleased at the prompt support given by England and France, and still more so by the general approval of their course by the presses of London and Paris.

Prussia is in a disturbed state. The Cologne Gazette says many symptoms appear leading to the supposition that war will be renewed between Denmark and Prussia.

In New York the heavy receipts of cotton at Southern ports prevents any material change under the Caledonia's news. Market firm, but with small sales.

River has fallen one foot at Cincinnati within the last twenty-four hours.

Further news by the Caledonia. New York, Nov. 23, '49. The London Times contains a letter from Austria of the 4th inst., from which it appears that the Emperor of Russia has carried his point with the Turkish government, despite the interferences of England and France—the Porte having pledged himself to keep in safe custody, in one or more of the Turkish fortresses all those refugees whose names may be mentioned by the Austrian or Russian governments, and banish the others. Under this arrangement, there is no chance for Kosuth and his compatriots to escape to England or the United States.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17, 1849. Settlement of the California Question—A New Bill to be Introduced—A Grand Compromise, &c.

A compromise, founded on mutual forbearance, and upon constitutional provisions and objects, and upon the usage of the government from its commencement till this hour, is already projected by eminent statesmen from the south and west which will, in all probability, settle the whole question, and avert the impending danger.

I am at liberty to say that on the first day of the session, notice will be given, in the Senate, of a bill to establish certain Territories; to provide for the admission of California; the creation of a new State in Texas; and the adjustment of the boundary between Texas and New Mexico.

The bill will provide for the establishment of the Territory of Deseret; also, for the Territory of South California; also, for the Territory of California, north of 36 deg. 30 min. The bill will provide that the territory of North-Carolina shall be admitted as a State into the Union; and at the same time it will provide that a portion of Texas, south of 36 deg. 30 min. shall be permitted to form a State Constitution; and that the question of boundary between Texas and New Mexico shall be submitted to a board of commissioners, &c.

Such a scheme will conform with the views of all moderate and patriotic statesmen, and with the principles on which the constitution was founded, and has been sustained. It cannot be doubted that the great compromiser, Mr. Clay, and the great defender and expounder, Mr. Webster, will go for this proposition. Mr. Benton is certainly bound to support it, and Mr. Calhoun and the whole South will embrace it as a means of saving the Union.
