NOGAL.

There is more activity in the Nogal

Mining District, just now, than for some

months past and there are some new

prospects being opened which could be

made profitable mines if the parties

could get the means to develop them.

This is one of the best fields in the

county for the prospector and capitalist

to operate in. The ores of the camp are

high grade and the veins are persistent

in depth. Water is encountered at from

fifty to one hundred feet below which

point pumping plants are required

which means larger capital than most

prospectors can control. Therefore,

many of these claims are idle. We hope

to see, at an early day, a just recognition

of the mines of this district by capital

when their development will be assured

and a profitable industry established.

We suggest to our Nogal friends the

propriety and probable advantage to

them of sending a full exhibit of the ores

of their camp to the fair and irrigation

congress to be held in Albuquerque in

September where those who would invest

in such properties will congregate. This

might result in great good to the camp

and country.

GOOD FOR HERMAN.

The following from the Albuquerque

Democrat relates a probable streak of

luck of another former resident and

business man of White Oaks:

"Great excitement prevails over the

discovery of high-grade gold ore in the

'New Mexican' mine at San Pedro.

"Herman Goodman, who owns a half

interest in this property, and who holds

a six months lease on the other half, is

in town, patiently waiting a report from

Assayer Jenks regarding his ore. Mr.

Goodman claims that the vein is two and

one-half feet thick, and estimates the

value at from \$75 to \$200 per ton. The

strike was made July 3, and since that

time every available moment has been

used in getting out the precious metal,

and there are now some fifty tons of this

ore on the dump. W. M. Emmert, who

owns the remaining half interest in the

mine, leased Goodman his interest for

six months at a remarkably low royalty,

and when he knows what has been found

he will in all probability regret his ac-

tion. Colorado may lead the states and

territories of this country today as a gold

producer, but New Mexico has as much

mineral, though yet undiscovered, and if

Goodman's assay pans out as he anti-

cipates, it will enthrone capital and energy

which now lie dormant."
