MAJOR S. L. JAMES.

The sad news of the death of Major S. L. James, lessee of the State Penitentiary, which occurred at his Angola plantation last Thursday, 26th inst., will be heard with deep regret by many people in this parish, who knew him well and had a sincere regard and esteem for him.

Major James, through his connection with levee building visited Tensas very frequently, and at one time owned the Marvdale plantation.

The following resolutions which we copy from the States are a striking testimonial to the kindness of heart of Major James:

"Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the great bell at the State penitentiary at Baton Rouge changed, and at its sound some hundred and sixty prisoners wended their way to the prison chapel.

The chapel was draped in mourning and each prisoner wore upon his breast a knot of crepe. The prisoners were called to order by one of their number who, in a few well-chosen words, told the men the object of meeting. All joined in singing hymns suitable for the occasion, and adopted the following resolutions:

"Let no one say hereafter that a convict is devoid of feeling.

"Whereas, in the dispensation of His mercy and goodness the Almighty God in his infinite wisdom, has taken from us our kind friend and protector, Major S. L. James, who has been, as it were, a kind and indulgent father to all of us.

Resolved, While we bow in humble submission to the inevitable decree of an all-wise and powerful divinity, that we deplore the sad calamity that has fallen upon us in his death, and in common with the many others who loved him we will mourn his loss.

"Resolved, That while we can expect no more favors at his hands, we are not unmindful of those received, and in token of our appreciation of same we respectfully request the Board of Control to insert these resolutions in the minutes of their next meeting.

"Resolved; That a copy of them be sent to the wife and family of the deceased with assurances of our heartfelt sympathy in this their sad hour of bereavement, in which our tears of sorrow mingle with their in lamenting the loss of one we all love so well.

"Resolved that we wear a badge of mourning for thirty days."
