Mr. Boatner is anxious to meet his Tensas constituents and everybody should take advantage of this opportunity to hear and meet our Congressman.

GOVERNMENT LEVEE WORK.

The sundry civil appropriation bill which carries the appropriation annually made by Congress for building levees has been signed by the President, and Capt. Mills, U. S. Engineer in charge of this District has gone to New York to attend a meeting of the River Commission at which the funds for levee work for the coming year will be allowed.

We learn that Capt. Mills recommended that the following repair work shall be done in this parish during next fall:
Kemp levee.....225,000 yds.
Hard Times levee..... 35,000 yds.
Hard Times-Wilson... 46,000 yds.
Ashwood.....125,000 yds.

The Commission will undoubtedly approve these recommendations of Capt. Mills and we can count with certainty on this important work being done.

This work, together with that let by the Fifth District Levee Board on last Wednesday amounting to about 608,000 yards, will give us the best line of levees we have ever had from the Arkansas line to Red River and we may well feel proud of the results obtained by our well directed efforts in the past few years in levee building.

Much, however, yet remains to be done. Assistant Engineer Boller Thompson is of the opinion that many million yards of earth must yet be added to the levees in increased slopes and berms before the line is safe. With increased height there is danger that sloughing will begin in flood time and this must be guarded against by adding to the slopes and by putting in berms at all weak points. And so the great work will go on until science and toil shall win the victory and the mighty Mississippi acknowledge the mastery of the invincible race which dwells on its banks.
