WANTED—A DEMOCRATIC NEWSPAPER.

A political campaign will terminate next Tuesday in this State which is fraught with grave consequences to the people. Democracy, white civilization and all that our people hold most dear are threatened by the movement in South Louisiana of the bolting sugar planters allied with the negro Republican party.

During this period of peril to our most sacred interests the white people of Louisiana have watched with growing indignation the attitude of the great New Orleans newspapers, the Times-Democrat and Picayune towards the burning questions which are to be decided next Tuesday.

They had a right to expect that these newspapers would speak in no uncertain tones and lend their powerful assistance to the cause of the people.

In this they have been bitterly disappointed.

Instead of the vigorous, decisive and unmistakable attitude which they had a right to expect from these papers, they have been disgusted at the half-hearted, namby-pamby manner in which they have discussed the great issues of the campaign. The truth is we have no great Democratic metropolitan morning newspaper in Louisiana. Both the Times-Democrat and Picayune, while claiming to be Democratic journals, are wedded to the high protection policy and utterly out of sympathy with the Democratic masses in and out of this State. It is true that the States has been doing noble work for its party and State, and has earned the gratitude of all our people, but that able journal is unfortunately for itself and its readers an evening paper and its influence and circulation, great though they be, are thereby necessarily somewhat curtailed.

Cannot the States take the field as a morning daily? As such it would supply a much needed want in Louisiana—a real, live Democratic morning newspaper.

When Gov. McKinley spoke in New Orleans recently he was invited by the Democrats to a joint debate on the tariff question.

The Governor wisely declined. We learn that Mr. E. H. Farrar had been selected as Gov. McKinley's antagonist in the event the joint debate had taken place. Mr. Farrar, whom Tensas is proud to claim as a son, would have utterly demolished McKinley, whose he outclasses in ability and knowledge of the tariff question.

EADS WAS RIGHT.

Capt. Eads' theory as to the rectification and deepening of the channel of the river by means of its confinement through levees, seems in process of confirmation already, although the levee system is still incomplete and the perfect control of the river within its banks is only in a measure accomplished. The fact that the river has, within the past few days, reached the lowest water mark on the Vicksburg gauge ever recorded and there still exists a good boating stage of water at all the most difficult and troublesome crossings on the river from Vicksburg to New Orleans, is very significant. Notwithstanding the extreme low water, as indicated by the gauges, steamboats are experiencing no trouble in navigation at Braunsburg, Ford's and other points, usually feared by steamboatmen, no trouble is reported now. There must be some cause for these conditions and that cause is to be found in the fulfillment of the Eads theory of the deepening of the river by confining it within its banks.

As the great work of levee building approaches its completion, we may confidently look forward to two results which the great engineer predicted—the protection of the alluvial lands from overflow and the permanent rectification and deepening of the channel of the river.

PROPOSALS FOR HIRING CONVICTS.

Acting under the authority of Act No. 29, of 1894, of the General Assembly, the Police Jury of Tensas parish will receive until 12 m o'clock on

Monday, December 3d, 1894,

sealed proposals for the hire of all convicts from said parish coming within the provisions of said act, the term of the contract for such hire to be two years beginning on said 3d December, 1894.

On said day bids will be opened in public session of the Board and the contract awarded to the highest bidder.

Under said act convicts are divided into two classes. First class, males over eighteen and under fifty five years of age; second class, all other convicts, and the wages of convicts of the first-class are fixed at between five and fifteen dollars per month and of convicts of the second-class at between two and ten dollars per month. Bidders should indicate in their proposals the amount bid for the respective classes of convicts.

The contracts awarded by the Police Jury shall be subject to such rules and regulations for the working, guarding and safe-keeping, clothing, housing and sustenance of convicts and for their discipline when idle or refractory, as the said Police Jury may from time to time adopt.

All proposals should be directed to the Clerk of the Police Jury at St. Joseph, La., and endorsed "Proposal for hire of convicts." The Police Jury reserves the right to reject any or all bids.
