A FRIENDLY BOXING BOUT TERMINATES FATALLY AT COLUMBIA.

Residence Burned. Fire at 4 o'clock Saturday evening destroyed the residence of Dr. H. C. Webb at Crowley. The flames enveled the building so rapidly that the occupants were unable to remove all the contents, the building being isolated and the wind in such direction as to prevent spreading. Loss \$1200; no

Delinquent Lands Sold. D. T. Stafford, sheriff and ex officio tax collector, sold at the courthouse at Alexandria Saturday, pursuant to advertisement, all property upon which taxes had not been paid for the year 1896. Of the property advertised eighteen pieces were sold to individuals. In default of bidders the remainder was adjudicated to the State.

The Hoops Burst on a Huge Water Tank, The hoops on a 40,000-gallon tank of water gave way Friday afternoon, at Lutcher, with startling explosion. Water was thrown in every direction for 100 or more feet around, terrifying the operators in Lutcher, Moore & Co.'s blacksmith shop. For the moment they forgot the river danger was over, and thought a crevasse was at band. No one was hurt.

Detective Charged With Perjury. Olin Durousseou, colored, was ar-rested at Opelousas Thursday morning and incarcerated on a charge of perjury. Durousseou is well known by the sheriff of the adjoining parishes, having been frequently employed by them to do detective work among his race. He has been connected with the sheriff's office at Opelousas for many years.

Fatal Ending of a Boxing Bout. Carey Townsend, while engaged in a boxing bout with Elisha Whittington Friday evening at Columbia, received a blow in the region of the heart from the effects of which he died almost instantly. Both were colored and had been friends. The evidence ad always duced at the coroner's inquest showed conclusively that the death of Town-

send was purely accidental, and Whit-tington was immediately discharged. Lumber for Exportation

Thirty-five cars of lumber for the export trade were shipped Saturday from Lake Charles, over the Southern Pa cific. The shipments for July to date will average ten cars a day. The signs of the times are brightening up. Two barges, the Trilby and the Olive, one loaded at Bradley-Ramsay's and the other at Perkins-Miller's, left in tow Saturday morning for Sabine Pass, where the cargoes will be transferred to steamers for European ports.

Celebrated His Eighty-Third Birthday. Jacob Irving celebrated, Saturday, his eighty-third birthday, having been a much respected citizen of Alexandria since '32, where he has a large family of children and a host of grand and great grand-children, and has accuratlated considerable property. He is the only living charter member of Oliver Lodge No. 84, Free and Accepted Masons. Mr. Irving is in fine health and moves around as a man of not more than 60 years.

Meeting of Members of the Bar. Pursuant to a call issued on the 14th by the members of the bar of the parish of Iberville, in view of the approaching constitutional convention to e held in this State, it is important that those interested in establishing the organic law should give expression of their views on this important subject, met Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at Plaquemine, Judge E. D. Talbot being elected chairman, and Mr. Moise L. Levy secretary. It was decided to send delegates to the meeting of attorneys of the State, to be held at Alexandria shortly.

Prisoners' Food Allowance Decreased. The police jury of Calcasien parish finished their work Saturday afternoon after having been in session two weeks. It was resolved to allow Sheriff Lyons only thirty-five cents a head a day feeding the prisoners in the parish jail. Heretofore the allowance has been fifty cents. They have had two meals a day, and they were good, wholesome meals. In other parishes t is customary to allow the sheriff forty cents each and furnish him a jailor. This order created a big stir around he courthouse, and a regular "how!"

North and South Railroad Wanted. Dr. Brown, of Camden, Ark., and Capt. Henderson, of Arkadelphia, rep resenting the Arkansas Southern Rail road, met the citizens of Ruston, Satarday, in a very enthusiastic meeting at the opera house. The Arkansas Southern Railroad, now terminating at Junction City, Ark, proposes to extend its route from that place to the Gulf. These gentlemen are making a canvass through North Louisiana to determine the best route for the road. Ruston is almost directly in line be tween Alexandria, the present terminus of the road, and Ruston and Lincoln parish have other points of great advantage over many of the other towns on the Vicksburg, Shreveport and

Pacific Railroad by reason of the soil and topography of the country. The opera house was crowded and the people were enthusiastic. Speeches were made by both of the visiting gentlemen, who seemed to look with marked favor

on Ruston over other North Louisiana towns. Among the other gentlemen who made vigorous speeches arguing the necessity of a North and South railroad to the upbuilding of the country were Judge E. M. Graham, who presided; Mayor C. K. Lewis, Col. A. T. Prescott and Judge Allen Barkedale. The Ruston people seem to be thor-enghly aroused over the matter and will do all in their power to induce the road to go through Ruston. Com-mittees were appointed from each ward thoroughly canvass the parish and to keep in correspondence

with the management of the road.

Veterans Meet at Opelousas. A regular meeting of R. E. Lee Camp, U. C. V., was held at Opelousas Saturday evening at Sandoz's opera house, Commander Sandoz in chair. A committee, composed of A. B. Anderson, L. D, Brescote and John N. Ogden, was appointed to draft suitable resolutions on the death of Charles Antonio. It was resolved that a meeting to organize a chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy be held at Sandoz's opera house on Saturday, July 25th, at 3:30 p.m. The meeting will be called to order by N. T. Blacksher, and the objects explained by Capt. L. D. Prescote. John N. Ogden will deliver the opening address. Music and recitations will form part of the meeting.

Robert Hingle, judge the twensy-second judicial court at of the twenty-second judicial court of Diamond, La., held the preliminary examination of Charles Bostram, Wm. Leddy, Arthur Morgan, Hy Brodtman, Emile Steele and Romaneous Oubre, the six Algiers residents, charged with outrageous conduct and breaking up the Enterprise Social Club's picnic that was given on July 4th at Cedar Grove park, in Plaquemines parish. After hearing the evidence in the case, the court committed the six accused to stand trial before the criminal district court that convenes next October. The accused were released on the same

Major J. G. Lee, after an appropriate address, was followed by Dr. W. G. Stubbs on "Rotation in Farming;" Mr. T. H. Jami son, a local speaker, on "Improved Stock;" R. M. Gill and John F. Cobb, farmers of Union, on "Making Farms Sustaining." Hon. Chas. Shular, of De Soto, gave an interesting talk on "Hog and Hominy." E. T. Sellers closed the meeting with a sensible and logical talk on "Hay and Forage

Mississippi River Improvement. Msj. Thomas H. Handbury, in charge of the river and harbor improvements on the Mississippi between the Ohio and Missouri rivers, has sub mitted his annual report to the war de-partment. Thirty-four thousand one bundred and twelve obstructions of all sorts were removed during the year. The object of the improvements on this section of the Mississippi is to eventually obtain a minimum depth at low water of six feet from the m of the Missouri to St. Louis and 8 feet at the same stage of water from St. Louis to the month of the Ohio river. The amount expended on this project to date is \$7,073,000. The expended during the year was \$500,000. Great Damage by Forest and Field Fires.

Forest and field fires are doing much damage in various portions of Califor-nia. Near the town of Red Bluff about nia. Near the town of Red Bluff about a dozen residences have been burned, cattle ranges, hestroyed, and standing crops are threatened. The loss is already over \$160,000. The hills near the town of Renwood are in flames and many farms are in danger. In the vicinity of Mount Diablo fire is laying waste to fields, and the mountain houses are threatened.
