CONDITIONS ARE GENERALLY SATISFACTORY

HENRY CLEWS' VIEWS

The Foreign Situation Is Improv ing. But Dull Season Is Approaching.

New York, Feb. 10.-Technically, herefore, the stock market is in an exceedingly strong position. Few stocks are in weak hands, and the floating supply being highly concen trated it is impossible to force selling by artificial means, and trading on the short side is not a favorite pastime just now for those having a serious regard for their financial health. The resuit is a speculative deadlock; new conditions being necessary to give the market a fresh start.

Among those who hold the bulk of the ficating supply of stocks, the opinion is decidedly bullish, and in such quarters very positive predictions of higher prices are current. In other circles, however, a decidedly conser vative tone exists. With many the old argument that prices are already as high as conditions justify is still a

It is worthy of note that bank clearings and railroad earnings, though very satisfactory, are showing steadily falling increases The iron trade is just now the only business exhibiting any phenomenal activity; and the demand for iron being special and abnormal that industry | cannot at this time be deemed a fair trade barometer. The grain movement at interior points is running nearly 50 per cent. below last year, and cotton receipts have begun to decrease also. Short crops of corn and cotton are at last beginning to show their effect, nor only upon railroad traffic but also upon the foreign exchange market; the consequent scarcity of commercial bills being the chief incentive for shipping over \$4,000,000 gold this week. A much more careful feeling is noticed in mercantile circles, where high prices on merchandise are beginning to show their effect in lessened sales and diminished consumption. There is no occasion to believe

that the end of good times is at hand; but here and there signs of having touched high-water mark are multiplying, and it is becoming clear that activity can only be continued by bringing prices down to a more reasonable level. We are now approaching the dull trade season, and during the next six months much will depend upon the crop outlook. Farmers are prosperous as a class; they have spent freely and the same is true in the mineral industries, which are yearly becoming more important factors in

our national prosperity. The general situation, however, is satisfactory. If the country seems posed to take a period for rest reflection after its recent activities, that may be regarded with satisfac tion. General conditions are sound credit is not overstrained, and there is vastly more prudence in regard to new and untried enterprises than was

the case a year ago.

The foreign situation shows distinct improvement. London being more hopeful in consequence of progress in South Africa and Berlin showing a partial revival resulting from the safe passing of a serious industrial orisis. A favorable feature in home affairs is the prospective abolition of the internal revenue war taxes, which caused congestion of funds in the Treasury, were becoming a serious menace to the money market and were the darkest sloud ovehanging the business situa tion. This danger it is hoped will soon be removed. Theefore all things consideed the local situation is becoming more favorable to upward manipulation. It is not altogether surprising that appearances indicate that a strong concerted effort is being made to lift the market out of its recent rut. Con. sequently the market hereafter will offer better opportunities for quick trading, but I advise taking all moderate profits rather than holding out for very big ones.
