Number of Parishes Will Hold Fairs This Year.

#### THE SEASON'S STRAWBERRY CROP

Will Bring Growers Half a Million Dollars. Number of Special Elections to Be Held.

According to the reports which have been received by the State Board of Agriculture and Immigration a number of parishes propose organizing parish fair associations and holding fairs this fall that have never been included in the list of fair holding parishes. Secretary Jas tremski, of the Louisiana State Board of Agriculture and Immigration, will leave Baton Ruoge the first part of in the interest of parish fairs, and he will visit those parishes where the en undertaken. He will assist the different circuits in arranging the dates for the fairs just as was done in the north Louisiana circuit. It is practically settled that the other fairs will adopt the resolution of the North Louisiana Association and cut out entirely the free pass feature. The idea in the Hepburn bill will be extened to all of the parish fairs of Louisiana.
