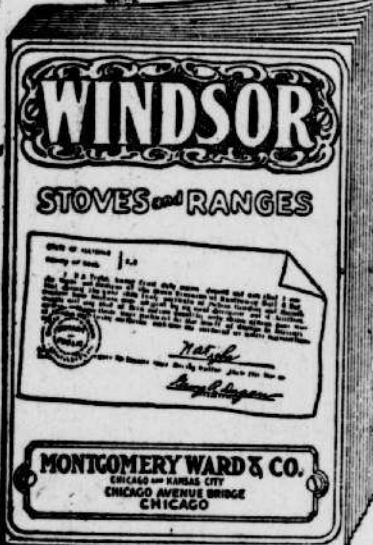

FOREST, Miss, Oct. 18.—A terrific explosion, which jarred buildings and rattled windows throughout the entire town about 9:30 o'clock Monday morning, caused considerable consternation among a great many people. Many who were on the street assert that in the heavens, in a southwesterly direction, they saw a sudden flash of fire and a cloud of smoke just previous to the sound of the explosion.

The noise was tremendous and sounded more like the blowing up of a saw mill than anything else. It is believed here that it was caused by the explosion of a large meteor while traveling through space. It is reported that Mrs. Willis Harper and Frank Baugh, at Braxton, saw a meteor flash across the sky there, its passage being accompanied by a strange sound like the roar of a locomotive, and that some cattle were greatly startled by the strange visitor.—Special to New Orleans Item.

The meteor referred to above was plainly visible in St. Joseph and was seen by several of our people, who describe it as a great ribbon of flame, bursting before extinguishing, though no report was audible here.
