LILY WORK

**Pillars Capped
by Capitals
of Beauty**

WHEN King Solomon built his temple he had set up in front of it two pillars, which he called Jachin and Boaz, meaning permanence and strength.

The cunning artist, Hiram of Tyre, made the pillars, which must have been imposing, from the many references to them; and in the account in the book of Kings it is said: "And upon the top of the pillars was lily work; so was the work of the pillars finished."

Lily work upon the pillars! It is a haunting word. All through the history of architecture men seem to have felt that the pillars of strength should be capped by the capitals of beauty.

The same law holds good in the realm of spiritual reality that holds good in the realm of material appearance.

The law is that the end of strength is beauty, and the basis of beauty is strength.

Virtue is pure strength; it is not usable in the temple of life until it becomes beautiful—that is, till it becomes love.

Love is virtue—with lily work.

Contrariwise, mere amiability, tenderness, a pleasing face and manner, with no strength of character beneath, is nothing but lily work for its own sake; hence cheap and unsatisfying.

So also goodness is the pillar, joy the lily work. Joy without goodness is moral tawdriness, and goodness without joy is moral crudeness.

The puritans were all for pillar; the cavaliers were all for lily work. There has been a world long conflict between the moralist, seeking for strength and the artist seeking for beauty.

Manly strength is not perfect; nor is womanly beauty; it is the union of the two, the family, which is perfect.

Cromwell and his Ironsides, smashing stained glass windows were pillars.

Read George Eliot's "Romola." Romola's husband was all lily work. I will tell you when the millennium will come. It will be when the good shall be beautiful, and the beautiful shall be good.

Then shall the future chronicler say: "At that time humanity solved its problem. Righteousness and peace kissed each other. For men had at last learned, in their lives as well as their houses, to crown all pillars with lily work, and put lily work only upon the pillars."

The national guard is an organization founded for the purpose of protecting state and city property and to quell riots which are too great to be handled by the civil authorities. It is also a reserve force of the army, each man being called upon to do nine months' service.

Many persons form the belief that the national guard is used only to fight strikers and to protect "scabs." I can honestly say that it is founded for no such ideas.

The national guard offers a young man many club features, such as athletic meets, indoor baseball, basket ball, dancing, vaudeville, rifle practice.

The rifle practice is absolutely without expense to members, as ammunition and transportation are furnished by the state.

All equipment is furnished by the state and a member is entirely without expense.

As far as fitting our children for business is concerned, the public schools of the United States are far inferior to those of European countries and far inferior to what they should be.

They are particularly deficient in foreign language instruction.

The systematic education of 90 per cent. of our public school children ends with their graduation.

Commercial methods and foreign languages must be made part of the public school course.

A boy or girl of fourteen ought at least to know enough of the social, religious and political customs and the language of the people with whom he may one day have to do business to whet his appetite for more. This is a business age.

The average American school boy, after eight years in public school, doesn't know where the principal cities in the United States are located.

Moderation in all things, advised St. Paul. There is a safe medium between the pace of an ox team that the old folks waited two or three days for and the speed of autos curving around corners into overcongested thoroughfares and the whizzing of lightning speeded motorcycles.

"All's well that end's well," and the tortoise oftentimes gets there first.

The hurried meals, the complexity of unwisely self-imposed obligations, the lack of backbone, which opposes with an emphatic "No" the desire of a morbidly constituted public which demands the sensational in sky, earth and water—are causes backing a great mortality in modern times.

Hurry and worry have almost done away with the fine art of meditation, which looks placidly at things present and largely and grandly into the eternal verities.

Passenger Cars Overtaken. Shreveport.—Two passenger cars were completely overturned when a Louisiana and Northwestern train went through a trestle one mile from Athene, La., more or less seriously injuring several persons, but no fatalities resulting. Among those hurt was Associate Justice A. D. Land of the Louisiana Supreme court, who was on a campaign tour.

President Vetoes Bill. Washington.—For the second time

within a year President Taft vetoed a bill to revise the wool tariff schedule K of the Payne-Aldrich law. With a message of disapproval the president returned to congress the bill evolved as a compromise between the house and senate, holding that its low rates would bring disaster to home industries. He appealed to congress, however, not to adjourn until it had enacted a measure to "substantially reduce unnecessary existing duties" without destroying protection for the wool industry in the United States.
