

DEATH OF HON. F. G. HUDSON.

Death of Miss Annie Amanda Hornsby.

Miss Annie Amanda Hornsby, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Hornsby, died at the family residence in St. Joseph, La., at 8 o'clock, on the evening of the 4th inst., after an illness of several weeks duration. She was a victim of typhoid fever, contracted at the Normal School at Natchitoches. When the outbreak of fever necessitated the closing of the school, she returned to her home and shortly thereafter was stricken with the fever which cost her her bright and promising young life. She was in her 22nd year and would have graduated in March. She possessed a particularly happy and amiable nature which won her many friends who lament her untimely demise.

Accompanied by the bereaved parents and a few friends, the remains were conveyed to Clinton, thence to the family cemetery on the Ratliff place north of town where interment was made at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, the religious services being conducted by Rev. J. B. Williams, of the Methodist Church.

The bereaved family have many relatives and friends in this parish who sympathize with them in their sore affliction.

Hon. G. H. Clinton from Tensas, Hon. J. B. Snyder and Mr. D. M. Evans from Madison, and several prominent citizens from East Carroll, went down to Baton Rouge last Sunday to appear before the Rail Road Commission to protest against the discontinuance of the through sleeper service now running between St. Louis and New Orleans. The result of their argument before the Commission was the refusal of the Commission to grant the prayer of the T. & P. road to permit the discontinuance of this train service. It is probable, however, that a slight revision will be made in the schedules on both the M., H. & L. and T. & P. roads to the end that the latter road will not be compelled to run an extra train for the special accommodation of the sleeper. This will cause our south-bound, now due to arrive at St. Joseph at 10:56, to come perhaps an hour earlier, but will not necessitate any change in the north-bound.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATION.

STATE OF LOUISIANA
DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
Baton Rouge, January 8, 1913.

Dear Superintendent—The State Examining Committee is now reporting the results of the August, 1912, examination of teachers to the various parish superintendents. This report probably shows that some of your teachers who took the examination and have been employed in your schools, or teachers who were examined in other parishes but have been teaching in your parish on provisional certificates, failed to pass the examination. If you have teachers who have been teaching on provisional certificates, and who failed to pass the August examination in order to square with the laws of the State it will be necessary for you to follow one of the following plans:

- (1) Dismiss those teachers who failed to pass the examination and who have been teaching under authority of provisional certificates, do not permit them to teach again until they can present certificates signed by the State Superintendent and the Chairman of the Examining Committee, and close the school for the rest of the session.
- (2) Employ teachers qualified under the law, but who will take the examination to be held January 30, 31 and February 1.

In other words, teachers who failed to pass the August examination cannot legally teach in the public schools for the rest of the session.

LEVEE NOTES.

The revetment work now in process of construction on White Oak Lake, containing 5,000 feet, is nearing completion. The work of revetment consists of driving 20-foot, 3 inch tongue heart cypress, 6 inches wide, 18 inches from toe of levee, below the surface, thus forming a solid wall which is guaranteed proof against seepage or depredations by crayfish. This is U. S. work, and the contractor has a heavy pile driver and full crew at work.

The Claggett levee, just above St. Joseph, and which caused so much uneasiness during the last high water fight, is being enlarged at ratio of 3 to 1, the contractor having been engaged on the work for possibly ninety days, and having completed at least sixty per cent of the work, and with increased force soon to go on, will insure completion of contract before the next water. This work is being done by the Levee Board and contains 4600 feet of dirt. A search ditch along the river side is being dug that will be 8 feet at top, 6 feet bottom and 4 feet deep.

The new loop at "Duckpond," containing about 1800 feet, has been begun by Contractor Pat Harris, who has one of the largest outfits on the river, and is pushing this work rapidly. This loop will contain about 70,000 yards of earth.

The slide that occurred at Kemp's levee during the last high water, and which alarmed our people so much, has been taken out entirely and rebuilt from the base, with 4 to 1 slope on both river and land side, the latter being supplemented by a 20 foot berm.


The work of raising Kemp up to grade, covering a distance of about 1800 feet, is progressing rapidly, and barring bad weather will be completed within the next sixty days.

The U. S. Government has a force of teams at work in Kemp Bend, restoring the wave wash on the new levee that was built last fall.
