

### THE RUSTON MEETING.

The New Orleans Picayune in an editorial under the above caption, says "A meeting was held at Ruston, Lincoln Parish, on the Fourth of July to condemn Louisiana's United States Senators Thornton and Ransdell, for opposing the destruction, by enactment of the new tariff bill, of the important sugar industry of Louisiana."

The Picayune is wrong, this was not the object of the meeting, but such a mistake on the part of the Picayune is excusable as this paper has been unable to see anything but sugar for some time. The object of the Ruston meeting was not to protest against the action of our Senators in trying to preserve the tax on sugar, but to protest against the report that our Senators would vote to retain the tax on every other tax burdened article if they could not retain the tax on sugar.

We would be glad indeed if our senators could retain the tax on sugar, but at the same time we want a great reduction in the tax on the other articles mentioned in the Underwood bill, and if to get such a reduction, it becomes necessary to put sugar on the free list, then as much as we would hate to see our friends in South Louisiana injured, we want sugar on the free list.

The meeting at Ruston was called to show our Senators that the people of North Louisiana feel that they are entitled to some representation in the United States Senate, and that when our Senators work in the interest of South Louisiana and against the interest of the balance of the state, that they are not keeping faith with the people who elected and trusted them.

The resolutions adopted by the Ruston meeting were dignified, free from bitterness, but to the point and we believe expressed the sentiments of a great majority of the democrats of Louisiana.

The Gazette, in the name of the people of Texas, joins the people of the parishes of Lincoln, Bienville, Jackson, Union, Richland, Caddo, Webster, Winn, La Salle, and East Carroll, in demanding that our two Senators support the Underwood-Simmons bill on its final passage in the Senate, thus proving to the Democrats of the Nation that Louisiana is a Democratic State in fact, and not Democratic in name only.

### PROCEEDINGS FIFTH LOUISIANA LEVEE BOARD.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS 5TH LA. LEVEE DIST. Talulah, La., July 7, 1913.

The Board of Commissioners for the Fifth Louisiana Levee District, met in regular session at Talulah, La., on Monday, July 7th, 1913.

The meeting was called to order by President Rhodes, and the following Commissioners answered to roll call:

On motion the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with. The reports of President Rhodes and Asst. State Engineer Robertson, detailing the necessary repairs and new levees of importance to the District were read and filed.

By resolution of Mr. Hill, adopted in the land matters, pending of M. A. Horne and Judge E. C. Montgomery, the President was authorized to take the matter up again with the District Attorney on certain points involved as to the rights of the Board in matter of quit claim deeds.

On motion of Mr. Hamley, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Resolved, that the claim of J. W. Carpenter, Agent, for damages to crops on Cabin-Teel plantation, in Madison parish, by reason of construction of a new levee, be paid and that two Commissioners for Madison parish, together with the President, are appointed a Committee to assess the damages, caused by the construction of said levee and to pay for same.

On motion Mr. of Hamley, the President of this Board was appointed a committee to represent the Board at a meeting of the Mississippi River Commission to be held in St. Louis, Mo., July 10th, for the purpose of urging that body as to the importance of certain work in this District and the emergency that confronts the District, with a view of getting immediate aid to carry out which the District will be unable to do unaided.

On further motion by Mr. Hamley, Commissioner Hill and President Rhodes were appointed a committee to visit the manufacturers of "Graders," in the City of Chicago, for the purpose of investigating the practicability of these machines in levee construction, with a view of purchasing one or more, for use in the District, if in the opinion of the Committee the said machines can be used to advantage by the District.

On motion of Mr. Johnson, the following resolution was adopted, to wit:

Be it resolved by the Board of Commissioners for the Fifth Louisiana Levee District, that on and after publication of this resolution, NO HOGS shall be allowed to run at large on the public levees within this district under any condition. Inspectors of the various parishes are notified, to see that this resolution is en-

forced. All resolutions heretofore existing are hereby repealed.

The following resolution was offered by Commissioner J. M. Johnson, and was adopted by the Board.

Whereas, it has come to the knowledge of this Board that Linnam & Bobbitt and Lawrence Bros. have not yet started on the enlargement of Reid and Biggs levees in Madison parish and as they have repeatedly been ordered to do so; and whereas, this contract was originally agreed to be completed on Dec. 1, 1912, and extended by agreement until Dec. 15, 1913, and if same is not started at once, it will be impossible to complete same on contract time, that this Board, do hereby order said Linnam & Bobbitt and Lawrence Bros., to have sufficient force at work on said levee not later than July 20, 1913, and if same is not complied with that the Board's attorney and President of this Board enter suit on Linnam & Bobbitt and Lawrence Bros.' bond, and that the President of this Board call this Board in session for the purpose of readjusting said work, in order to get same completed by time of next high water, not later than Dec. 15, 1913. That a copy of this resolution be sent to Linnam & Bobbitt and Lawrence Bros., bondsmen, and that all legal steps taken necessary to abrogate this contract, or enforce same.

On motion of Mr. S. D. Watson, adopted by the Board, Commissioners J. M. Johnson and T. P. Kell were appointed a committee to confer with Governor L. E. Hall and Chief of State Engineers, Maj. F. M. Kerr, with a view of, if possible, additional appropriation from the State Engineers fund to aid in the necessary levee building and repair work in this District.

The bids for weed cutting in the District were opened and considered. The bid of Mr. K. P. Chaze for \$2000, for the entire District, comprising East Carroll, Madison, Tensas and Concordia, was accepted, being the lowest bid submitted. Specifications and map for drainage of the Salem and Willow Point Loop levees were submitted to the Board by Assistant State Engineer Robertson and the matter was discussed, but no action was taken at this time.

On motion the Board adjourned subject to call of the President.

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for the Fifth Louisiana Levee District.

Gentlemen:-

Our regular meeting was fixed for the 9th inst., on account of the Mississippi River Commission meeting at St. Louis on the 10th inst. and for the purpose of considering our projected work for the year, before the meeting of that Honorable Body. I called the meeting to-day.

Since our last meeting, in company with our State Engineer, I have gone over our line of levee and he has made a statement of the work needed for the year. In regard to the enlargement work undertaken by the Government on the Lake Providence front, on account of the sandy soil and broad exposure to the river, for the better protection of this important point, it should be built with the 4 to 1 slope. The contract as originally can only be increased 20 per cent, which is probably not enough to carry this work through, with that slope, so after consulting with members of our executive committee and the United States Engineers, I authorized Capt. Tollinger to complete the work with the 4 to 1 slope and our Board would pay for yardage necessary that was not covered by their contract, up to the amount of 5000.

The emergency work let by Capt. Sherrill, subject to the approval of his superiors, at Ingfield, below the Town of St. Joseph and at "Vauclose," Lake St. John crevasse, knowing the necessity in of prompt action in closing the opening at Lake St. John and to facilitate this work, after consulting with as many of our executive committee as I could reach by phone, I notified Capt. Sherrill and the contractors interested that our Board would guarantee all work done on these contracts up to July 10th and for them to proceed with the work; since that date, June 21st, the Mississippi River Commission, through Gen. Bixby, have approved the letting of Vauclose levee.

Work is progressing very satisfactorily in most every part of the District, some new contractors are coming in. With favorable weather all the urgent work should be near completion before the winter rains set in.

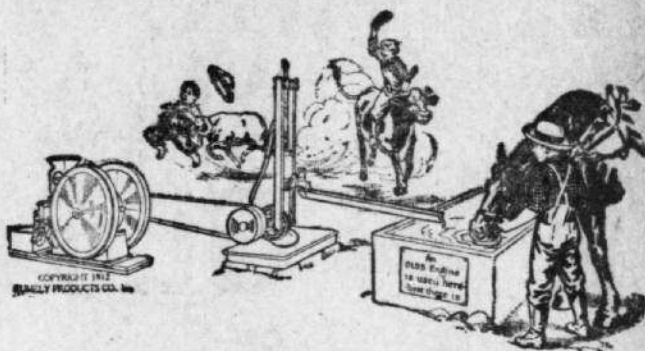

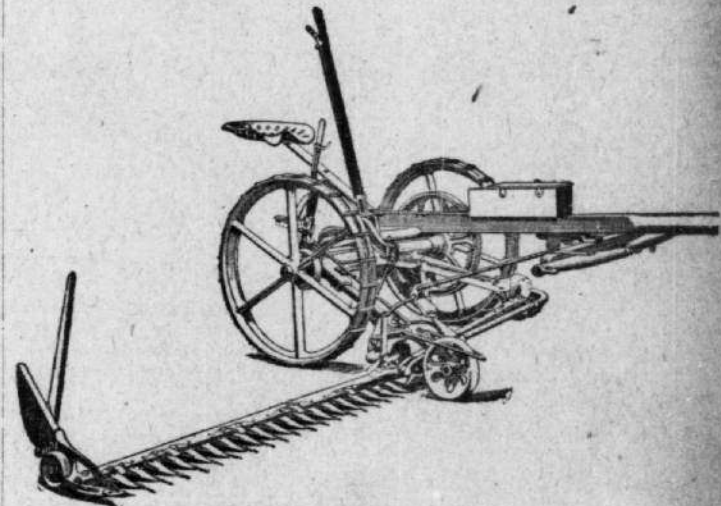
