DEATH OF MRS. JOHN K. GUICE.

The news of the death of Mrs. John K. Guice was received in St. Joseph on Tuesday morning with greatest regret. She was universally beloved by all who knew her and had a number of very close friends in St. Joseph who feel deep sorrow in her taking. The sympathy of our entire people goes out to her grief-stricken husband and family in their bereavement.

The Natchez Democrat pays the following tribute to the deceased: Mrs. Mary E. O'Brien Guice, wife of J. K. Guice, a well known planter near Waterproof, La., died yesterday morning at 1:10 o'clock, and her remains were brought to Natchez for interment, the funeral taking place yesterday afternoon at five o'clock from Foster's Funeral Parlors in Main street.

Rev. Geo. Fox, of the Methodist Church, Waterproof, conducted the funeral services.

Mrs. Guice was born in Natchez on Jan. 24, 1847, and was in her 68th year. She married John K. Guice in 1872, and removed to the Guice plantation, four miles from Waterproof. In addition to a brother, Walter S. O'Brien, of Helena, Ark., and a sister, Miss Zada O'Brien, who lived with her, she is survived by a son, John K. Guice, Jr., and two daughters, Mrs. C. C. Skinner, of St. Joseph, and Miss Rosa A. Guice. Mrs. L. B. Hunter, of Waterproof and Miss N. D. Guice are stepdaughters.

The remains were accompanied to Natchez by the members of the family and several friends, the funeral party being composed of the following:

J. K. Guice, Sr., J. K. Guice, Jr. Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Skinner, Miss Rose Guice, Mr. and Mrs. W. D. A. Gorton, Mr. and Mrs. N. B. Hunter, and Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Hunter.

Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Connor, of Vidalia also attended the funeral. Mrs. Guice has been in failing health for several months. She bore her sufferings with the sweet Christian fortitude which has been characteristic of her whole life.

Mr. Guy N. Hunter paid a beautiful tribute to her memory when he said she was a sweet, unselfish Christian gentlewoman, who never thought of self, whose greatest happiness was in giving pleasure to others. She was ever ready to comfort the sick and distressed and the world was made better by her influence and gentle ministrations to others.—Natchez Democrat.

DEATH OF MRS. A. J. BEAUMONT.
