FINANCIAL STATEMENT OF PARISH TREASURER.

St. Joseph, La., Feb'y. 8th, 1915.
 To the Hon'l. Police Jury,
 Tensas Parish, La.

Dear Sirs:—I have received from the Sheriff & Tax Collector, since January 1st—

Against this balance, I have bills amounting to about \$500.00, and the Clerk of the Police Jury advises me that there is still about four hundred dollars of last year's approved bills, for which scrip has not yet been issued.

As will be observed from the above, I have expended \$11,738.03 to cover appropriations for last year, and which were held over until after my January and February settlements with the Tax Collector. There was expended for dipper-vals last year the sum of \$6,189.13; roads, \$8,652.22; road and vehicle tax collection, \$3,793.35.

It is difficult to tell just what future collections will be. The road tax collections are uncertain, and grow less every year, and there will probably be an unusually large delinquent roll, but the Collector and myself made an estimate of the probable collections, at about \$9,000.00. To this must be added a whiskey license of one thousand dollars, due the parish by the Town of Newellton, which, added to the above, will give the parish a total available cash supply of, say: \$18,000.00.

An approximate estimate even of future expenses is hard to make, as everything depends upon the appropriation made by your honorable body. Annual interest \$894.00 on the old bond issue, will be due on March 1st, and the semi-annual interest \$1,137.50 on the Court House and Jail bonds will be due August 1st next. There is still outstanding, bonds of the old issue, amounting to \$14,000.00, all of which fall due March 1st, 1917, and which will have to be paid or refunded. Nine bonds of the Court House and Jail issue, amounting to \$4,500.00, have been taken up and all interest on the total Court House and Jail bonded indebtedness has been paid up to February 1st.

Miss Mary Belton Wade, of Jefferson county, died in this city at 9:30 p. m. Saturday after an illness of several months.

She was born in Jefferson county, April 13th, 1842. She was the daughter of the late Wilson Wade, who was a native of South Carolina, and Mrs. Martha Dunbar Wade, of Adams county. She was a cousin of Walter R. Wade and aunt of Mrs. Eugene Enoch. Miss Wade was a frequent visitor to Natchez and had many friends here.

The funeral was held this morning at the family burial ground near Red Lick, Rev. Joseph Kuehne officiating.

The above notice of the death of Miss Mary Belton Wade is taken from the Natchez News-Democrat of Monday, 15th inst., and the news of the death of this good lady is learned in St. Joseph with greatest regret by many of our older citizens, who knew her quite well when she made her home with the late Mrs. H. A. Garrett as companion for her mother, the venerable and lamented Mrs. J. F. H. Claiborne, widow of the distinguished Mississippian. During her residence in St. Joseph Miss Wade was universally beloved by our people, who appreciated her kindly nature and strong Christian character, and her devotion to her charge. Miss Wade was a cousin of Hon. Thos. M. Wade, of St. Joseph.

Filmore Smith, a familiar negro character who was well known in this parish, died of appendicitis at the Natchez Hospital this week. Filmore had long been of poetical mind and many of his songs and verses were not without merit. He will be greatly missed by white and colored alike.
