It kills the germs. MISS JENNIE PARR. Miss Jennie Parr, 69 years old, died at her residence at 912 Missouri avenue, at 6 o'clock Sunday morning. The body was taken in charge by the North Fort Worth Undertaking company and the funeral services were held at St. Mary's Catholic church on Magnolia avenue, at 9 o'clock Monday morning with interment at Greenwood. The above notice is taken from the Fort Worth, (Texas) Record of July 24th, and the news recited will be learned with regret by our entire people, who knew Miss Jennie Parr during the many years she lived at St. Joseph. Away back during the administration of President Grant, Miss Parr was appointed Post Master at St. Joseph and following her term of office she conducted a store here and lived with her aged mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. John Baptist Vallee, whom she supported many years, and indeed, sacrificing her life to the comfort of these two old people. Leaving St. Joseph in 1903 she located with her mother at Fort Worth and cared for the latter until her death some years ago. Miss Jennie, as she was familiarly known to all our people, was a good Christian woman and a faithful member of the Roman Catholic Church, and a hard worker her entire life. By energy and industry and economy, despite her burdens, she accumulated some property here and was one of the sufferers in the great fire that swept away the business section of St. Joseph on the memorable night of October 29th, 1901. Undiscouraged she set to work to rebuild her store ere the embers had scarcely cooled and had the distinction of having the first building completed in the burned district, and which is now the property of Mr. Salvador Baragona. With her death we suppose her family has become extinct, at least in these parts. Her step-father, Mr. Vallee, a native of France and a cook by profession, and whose father is said to have followed the great Napoleon into Russia, was for years attached to the household of President Jefferson Davis, serving the great Confederate chieftain faithfully until the latter's imprisonment following the close of the civil war.
