#### PROCLAMATION.

St. Joseph, La., June 4, 1918.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Police Jury of Tensas Parish, Louisiana, at a meeting held on the 4th day of June, 1918, I, Frank H. Curry, President of said Police Jury, do hereby give notice that, in compliance with said Ordinance, a special election will be held in Tensas Parish, Louisiana, on

Tuesday, July 30th, 1918,

for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To levy a special tax of Two Mills (.002) on the dollar on all property in Tensas parish, Louisiana, subject to taxation, annually, for the period of two years, for the purpose of giving additional aid for the public roads.

For the purpose of said special election the polling places will be the regular polling places in each ward of said parish, and the following Commissioners and Clerks of election at each polling place have been appointed to serve at this election:

At said special election the polls will be open at 8 o'clock a. m. and close at 6 o'clock p. m., said election being conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 12 o'clock, noon, on the 1st day of August, 1918, the said Police Jury for Tensas parish, Louisiana, will meet in open session at the Court House in St. Joseph, Louisiana, and proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said special election.
