

## PROCLAMATION.

St. Joseph, La., June 4, 1918.

Pursuant to an ordinance passed by the Police Jury of Tensas Parish, Louisiana, at a meeting held on the 4th day of June, 1918, I, Frank H. Curry, President of said Police Jury, do hereby give notice that, in compliance with said Ordinance, a special election will be held in Tensas Parish, Louisiana, on

Tuesday, July 30th, 1918,

for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and laws of the State of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

To levy a special tax of Two Mills (.002) on the dollar on all property in Tensas parish, Louisiana, subject to taxation, annually, for the period of two years, for the purpose of giving additional aid for the public roads.

For the purpose of said special election the polling places will be the regular polling places in each ward of said parish, and the following Commissioners and Clerks of election at each polling place have been appointed to serve at this election:

First Ward.—Henry Isaacs, R. W. Newell, Geo. D. Bland, Commissioners; E. C. Grace, Clerk.

Second Ward.—1st Precinct—L. deVries, Arthur Moore, John D. Lynch, Commissioners; Julius Salomon, Clerk.

Second Ward—2nd Precinct—John W. Osborn, D. A. Lawrence, L. C. Lovejoy, Commissioners; Frank L. Reagan, Clerk.

Third Ward—J. P. Scott, E. J. Walton, A. B. Ratcliff, Commissioners; D. A. O'Kelley, Clerk.

Fourth Ward—Wiley Cavin, Richard Lynch, Jos. F. Gibson, Commissioners; B. Y. Berry, Clerk.

Fifth Ward—A. B. Knowles, W. H. Scott, W. P. Burns, Commissioners; D. H. O'Kelley, Clerk.

Sixth Ward—H. T. Goldman, R. N. Hunter, R. C. Lancaster, Commissioners; H. M. Marks, Clerk.

Seventh Ward—D. F. Miller, R. C. Gibson, F. E. Bowman, Commissioners; E. F. Goza, Clerk.

At said special election the polls will be open at 8 o'clock a. m. and close at 6 o'clock p. m., said election being conducted in accordance with the laws of the State of Louisiana, applicable thereto.

Notice is also given that at 12 o'clock, noon, on the 1st day of August, 1918, the said Police Jury for Tensas parish, Louisiana, will meet in open session at the Court House in St. Joseph, Louisiana, and proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns, and declare the result of said special election.

than any one else to know what Louisiana is doing along agricultural lines. Their weekly reports this spring and early summer show that the farmers have made an excellent start toward producing large amounts of food and feed crops. Much attention has been paid to the quality of seed planted and to preparation of the land. Greatly increased acreages have been sown to grazing and soil renovating crops. In some parishes the acreage in velvet beans has been increased many fold.

Extracts from the reports of agents are given:

Better Poultry in Livingston.  
 J. O. Bethea, Livingston—Farmers as a rule are increasing their farm flocks. Some are raising pure bred poultry, and in some cases they are making poultry a paying part of their farm business.

Selected Seed Corn Planted.  
 S. W. Vance, Madison and East Carroll—We will have the largest corn acreage this year that has ever been planted in my territory. Land is in a better state of cultivation and more attention has been paid to selecting seed corn.

Large Acreage of Food Crops.  
 T. I. Watson, Tensas and Madison—Everybody is in earnest about planting food and feed crops and indications are that there will be the largest acreage of food and feed crops ever grown in this section of the country.

45,000 Acres in Velvet Beans.  
 T. W. Patten, Bienville—There will be about 45,000 acres planted to velvet beans in Bienville Parish this year. The banks bought the bean seed and let the farmers have them at cost.

Co-operative Shipment of Wool.  
 B. M. Jackson, Ouachita—I have collected 1,400 pounds of wool for a co-operative shipment during the coming week, and expect to have something like 2,000 pounds by that time.

Corn, Cowpeas and Velvet Beans.  
 W. M. Crumpton, Lincoln—One of our demonstrators pastured during the winter two head of horses, three cows and a number of hogs on a ten-acre field planted to corn in six-foot rows with peas in the middle row and velvet beans between the stalks of corn on the row. He has made \$75.00 from the sale of peas, has plenty for his own use, and without any other feed sold milk and butter from the three cows during the entire winter.

Velvet Beans Increased 1,000 Per Cent.  
 S. W. Houston, Union—This parish will plant 6,000 acres in velvet beans, an increase of more than 1,000 per cent over last year.

Big Profits in Hogs.  
 W. H. Humble, Rapides—One of my demonstrators in hog raising and feeding recently shipped two cars of hogs which sold for more than \$4,800. This man plants grazing crops for his hogs, feeds them every day, and makes big profits from the business.

Sheep Increase in Beauregard.  
 G. C. Chassey, Beauregard—The


