The Inter-State Rate Controversy.

In reply to the petition from patrons of the road in this parish recently, requesting reduction in interstate rates between local points, Mr. Busch of the Missouri-Pacific has addressed the following letter to Mr. W. M. Davidson, which offers very little encouragement. It now looks like trade out of Natchez and Vicksburg for Louisiana points along the river will of necessity return to the Natchez and Vicksburg packet line and may mean revival of the old days of steam boat activity between these two cities—a consummation mostly devoutly to be wished.

St. Joseph, Louisiana:

Dear Sir:
Mr. Bush has referred to me for further handling, your letter of January 31st, enclosing a petition signed by various firms and individuals, with respect to rates on grain and grain products from Natchez and

Vicksburg to St. Joseph, La., and nearby points.

It is probably known to you and your constituents that the entire rate adjustment affecting not only the local rates within Louisiana, but also the interstate rates from bordering interstate cities such as Natchez and Vicksburg, has for some time past been before the Interstate Commerce Commission with a view to first removing the discrimination which was complained of by shippers between the state and interstate rates and second, to prescribe a fair and reasonable basis of rates for both state and interstate movement. The adjustments which have been made subsequent to October 27th, 1920, and which will be further modified, effective March 15th, 1921, result from these proceedings.

I am doubtful from your petition, whether or not you have a correct conception of the present adjustments. Taking St. Joseph as a basis, the present rates are:—

As a result of these proceedings, however, and effective March 15, 1921, all less carload rates both state and interstate applying on grain and grain products will be cancelled and such traffic will hereafter move at the class rate. In making this change we are following the general practice and custom throughout the entire western territory, where with very few exceptions, less carload shipments of grain and grain products are handled on class rates, while suitable carload rates are provided for carload movement.

This will necessarily force a change in commercial conditions to the extent that it will be necessary for firms or communities to handle grain and grain products in carload quantities in order to take advantage of the lower rates established for such movement. This is being done almost universally throughout the west and I have no doubt but that your people can accommodate themselves to the same conditions.

The further revision in the rates on grain and grain products which will be made effective March 15th, are as follows:

It will be noted from the above that aside from the cancellation of the less carload rates and the application in lieu thereof of the class rates which I have just explained, there is a reduction contemplated of 2 1/2 cents per 100 pounds on grain and grain products other than flour, and a reduction of 1 cent on flour in carloads from Natchez, while from Vicksburg, on account of two line

service involved, there is an increase of 2 cents on grain and grain products other than flour and 4 cents on flour, carloads.

I trust that this explanation will put the matter in the proper light before you and that your people may be satisfied with the adjustment as proposed.

Mr. J. H. Wheeler died at his home at St. Joseph on Monday morning, after lingering illness. Ever of religious instinct though unostentatious he went his way through life doing his duty as God gave him light to see it and when during his illness he became aware that the end was approaching he was happy to welcome our local pastors to his bedside and join in their petition for comfort for his good wife in her hour of darkest sorrow. Quietly and peacefully he passed out of life, leaving to his companion the memory of his good name as comfort in her grief. The remains were taken to Natchez for interment and were accompanied by his wife and couple of friends.
