**PROCEEDINGS BOARD OF ALDERMEN, TOWN OF ST. JOSEPH.**

Be it known that on this the 3rd of May, it being the first Tuesday in said month, and day for the regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the town of St. Joseph, said honorable body met at the office of the mayor.

There were present: Hon. W. M. Davidson, mayor, and Dr. Jos. Whitaker, Dr. G. N. Clarke, Mr. A. B. Ratcliff, Mr. C. C. Skinner and Mr. B. F. Young, aldermen.

The Honorable Mayor and members of the Board of Aldermen, all being present, presented their commissions of office and accordingly took their seats.

The meeting was called to order by the mayor and upon motion reading of minutes of last meeting was dispensed with.

Upon motion, Mr. A. B. Ratcliff was elected mayor pro tem, for the period of two years.

Upon motion, Dr. G. N. Clarke was elected street commissioner for the term of two years, and upon motion Mr. Chas. C. Skinner was elected assistant street commissioner for the same time.

Upon motion, Mr. Josiah P. Scott was elected clerk of this board for the term of two years.

Upon motion, Mr. R. H. Whitney was elected treasurer for the town of St. Joseph for the term of two years.

Upon motion, Dr. Whitaker, Dr. Clarke and Mr. Ratcliff were appointed on the Finance Committee for the town of St. Joseph.

Upon motion, Dr. Whitaker, chairman, and Dr. L. A. Murdock, Mr. A. M. Smith, Mr. Fred Skinner and Mr. J. C. Macpherson were appointed on the Board of Health for the town of St. Joseph.

Upon motion a Fire Committee, composed of Dr. Clarke, Mr. Macpherson and Mr. H. L. Smith, was appointed, whose duty it will be to inspect all buildings within the fire limits of the town, and particularly within that certain fire zone, known as "fire district," in which, by previous ordinance, it is unlawful to erect other than fire-proof buildings, and to condemn any and all buildings within or without the fire zone that in their opinion may be dangerous and hazardous to the neighboring community, and a menace to other properties. Said committee was also vested with authority to enquire into cost of various fire extinguishers and to report their findings to this board at its next meeting. The attention of the board having been called to the fact that the town minute book containing the official proceedings of meetings of this board, since incorporation of the town, in 1901, had been destroyed, or become so worm-eaten as to be useless, it was upon motion agreed to employ some one to prepare a new book of all proceedings, copying same from the files of the Tensas Gazette, official journal of the town.

And ther being no further business, upon motion the board adjourned to meet on Tuesday, the 10th May, 1921.


