Act of Incorporation of WINTER QUARTERS PLANTATION, INC.

State of Louisiana, Parish of Tensas. Be It Known and Remembered, that on this, the 28th day of December, A. D. 1921, before me, E. F. Newell, Deputy Clerk of Court and Ex-officio Notary Public, duly commissioned and qualified in and for said Parish of Tensas, State of Louisiana, in the presence of the persons named in the foregoing, personally came and appeared, the several persons whose names are hereunto subscribed, who declared, that, availing themselves of the provisions of the laws of the State of Louisiana relative to the organization of corporations and particularly of Act No. 287 of 1914, of the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, they have consented and agreed, and do, by these presents, covenant and agree, bind, form and constitute themselves, as well as each other persons who may hereafter join or become associated with them, into a corporation and body politic in law, for the objects and purposes, and under the agreements and stipulations following, to-wit:

ARTICLE I. The name and title of this corporation shall be the Winter Quarters Plantation, Inc., and under its corporate name it shall have and enjoy existence and succession for the term of ninety-nine (99) years from this date, and all the rights, advantages and privileges granted by law to corporations, including power to contract, sue and be sued in its corporate name; to make and use a corporate seal, and the same to break and alter at pleasure; to hold, receive, purchase, convey, mortgage, hypothecate and pledge property, real and personal; to issue bonds, notes and other obligations; to have and employ managers, directors, officers, agents and other employees, as the interests and conveniences of the corporation may require; and to make and establish such committees and to create such by-laws, rules and regulations for the corporate management and for control of the affairs of said corporation as may be deemed necessary and expedient.

ARTICLE II. The domicile of this corporation shall be in the Town of St. Joseph, Parish of Tensas, State of Louisiana, and all citation and other legal process shall be served on the President, and in his absence on the Vice President, and in the absence of both of said officers on the Secretary of said corporation.

ARTICLE III. The objects and purposes for which this corporation is formed, and the nature of the business to be carried on by it, are hereby declared to be: To purchase, lease, acquire, exchange and hold property, both real and personal, and the same to sell, exchange and dispose of; to grow cotton, corn, oats, hay and other agricultural products; to conduct a retail mercantile business; to buy, sell and rear cattle, horses, mules and hogs; to acquire, hold, operate, sell and exchange timber lands and agricultural lands; and to do and perform all other such matters as may be related, incidental to, growing out of or become necessary or advisable for the conduct or operation of the purposes and business and occupations hereinabove set forth.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this corporation is hereby fixed at the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00), divided into and represented by seven hundred and fifty (750) shares of the par value of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) each. An accurate, detailed and itemized description of the property as to amount, location, extent, etc., taken in payment for capital stock together with a statement of its value as appraised by the directors, is annexed to this charter to be read in connection therewith.

ARTICLE V. All the corporate powers of this corporation shall be vested in a Board of Directors to be composed of three (3) stockholders, to be elected annually on the third Monday of January of each year, at eleven o'clock A. M.

The Board of Directors shall elect from among themselves a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary-Treasurer. The following persons have been chosen to serve on the Board of Directors of this corporation, as the first Directors, until the third Monday of January, A. D., 1922, or until their successors are elected and qualified: Eben R. Wortham, Greenville, Miss.; Sidney T. Shaw, Newellton, La.; Thos. M. Wade, Jr., St. Joseph, La. with the said Eben R. Wortham as President, Sidney T. Shaw as Vice President and Thos. M. Wade, Jr., as Secretary-Treasurer.

ARTICLE VI. This charter may be amended, altered or modified, or the capital stock increased or decreased, or the corporation dissolved, at a meeting of the stockholders duly called for that purpose, and in such manner as may be permitted by the laws of Louisiana, now or hereafter enacted.

ARTICLE VII.

Upon the termination of the charter or upon the dissolution of the corporation, its affairs shall be liquidated in the manner provided by any law of Louisiana, now or hereafter enacted.

ARTICLE VIII. No stockholder shall ever be held liable or responsible for the contracts or faults of this corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due to this corporation on the shares owned by him, nor shall any mere formalities in organization have the effect of rendering this charter null, or of exposing the stockholders to any liability beyond such unpaid balance.
