INTRODUCED IN JAPAN

THOROUGH INSPECTION OF THE OYSTER BEDS

Recently because of the appearance of a few cases of typhoid fever, there was some hysterical talk about the danger of eating raw oysters, despite the fact that the Louisiana oyster is basted free from any source of typhoid infection. Nearly a decade ago the scientists of the Federal government in a widely distributed pamphlet declared that because of the situation of the oyster grounds in a remote region from any center of population, the Louisiana oyster was safe and would remain less subject to infection than the oysters from any other section of the country. The oyster beds are not only distant from any considerable population, but because of the marsh along the Gulf coast will always be so isolated or at least for many generations to come.

In addition to this natural protection of the source of supply the Conservation Department of the State has for years made periodic inspections of the oyster beds in relation to possible infections and has unceasingly impeded the fishing boats and the fishermen who are engaged in the trade. It is certain that there could be no infection of the Louisiana oyster shell after the hivate passed into the hands of the retail dealer. At that point the authority of the Conservation Department ceases, and the matter of protection of the public devolves on the health authorities.

In the next inspection of the oyster beds, the State Board of Health will cooperate with the Conservation Department, and a thorough biological and chemical examination of the oysters and the waters surrounding them will be made. The Conservation Department will supply one of its best boats for the work, and a working laboratory will be set up, with the State chemist in charge, while agents of the department will send along experts and practical oyster men to aid in the investigation.

The State Health Board has already declared the oyster to be free from infection, but the present investigation comes at a good time to set doubts at rest.

TAKE MOTION PICTURES AT SHOOTING GROUNDS

The opening of the Public Shooting Grounds at Pass-a-Goutre has attracted attention throughout the country, and sportsmen generally are much interested in the project, which is regarded as unique in the hunting history of the United States. So much interest has been aroused in the establishment of this hunting ground that Field and Stream, one of the leading sportsmen's papers of the country, determined to add to its series of motion pictures of hunting scenes the duck shooting at the Pass. To this end Hy. S. Watson, editor-in-chief of the magazine, recently came to New Orleans, accompanied by an expert cameraman, to take pictures.

The two went to the Pass, and two days later were followed by Commissioner Alexander, of the Conservation Department; H. H. Kopman, superintendent of the information division of the department, and Senator W. L. Bogwell, of West Carroll parish, in a hydroaeroplane. The party flew down the river 36 miles to the Pass in one hour and a quarter, and while they were there the cameraman secured some excellent pictures, which will be shown throughout the United States and abroad, wherever the series of Field and Stream Pictures are presented.

After the pictures were secured from the ground, Mr. Alexander took the cameraman up in the plane and views were taken of the ground, showing its division into marsh, ridge, ponds and bayous. These pictures will be of incalculable value to the Department of Conservation, as additions to the maps of the grounds already in its possession. Altogether the trip was a profitable one and will prove of much value to this latest addition to the sporting life of the State.
