A CAMPAIGN IN DISTRESS.

Mr. Parker's abandonment of his campaign in South Louisiana to go back to North Louisiana is a straw showing how the tide is running.

The Parker managers and newspapers only a little while back were telling us that so thorough had been Mr. Parker's canvass of North Louisiana, and so extraordinary the enthusiasm over him, that he was coming down to the mouth of the Red with a majority over Col. Stubbs; and it was in the gossip that the closing weeks of the campaign were to be devoted to setting New Orleans and South Louisiana parishes on fire.

But evidently there has been a "Save-us-Cassius" cry from North Louisiana, consequent upon the very heavy slump to Col. Stubbs, which, according to reports from various sources, has recently set in there—the result of the campaigning of Col. Stubbs himself and Dr. Aswell and Congressman Wilson, or Mr. Parker would not be striking back at the territory he had already traversed and quitting the Third District where his majority of 1916 is being cut to pieces.

That he should quit New Orleans after making a couple of speeches is not surprising. Here the people know him, here they are more bitterly opposed to him than ever because of his slanders against the city, and here he can make no headway. But it is a surprise to find him shifting back to the other end of the State when all over South Louisiana he is steadily losing ground.

The truth is that the Parker campaign is going to pieces everywhere. Mr. Parker himself, his irresponsible campaign managers and his newspapers have set up a cry that the fight is over, and that he will be overwhelmingly nominated, the object being to stampede the voters who are trying to land on a winner. But the fact of the matter is that Mr. Parker's cause is hopeless unless a stampede can be created in his favor, and that no longer is possible.

The voters cannot now be fooled. They know that four years ago Mr. Parker talked as certainly of his election as he is talking now, and that his two newspapers were extravagant in his claims, but that on election day the votes he polled were in great disproportion to the noise that he and his leaders and followers had made; and there is a well-settled conviction among most intelligent political observers that while Mr. Parker will not be beaten as badly as he was when he was running as a Bull-Mooser, his defeat by a heavy majority is forecast by every sign.—N. O. States.

PROCEEDINGS OF CONCORDIA PARISH SCHOOL BOARD.

Vidalia, La., January 5, 1920. The Concordia Parish School Board met in regular session in the middle room of the Parish Officers' Building in the town of Vidalia, on the 5th day of January 1920.

Vice-President H. C. Sevier called the meeting to order and on roll call the following members answer to their names: Messrs. J. M. Davis, H. F. Gregory, H. C. Sevier, Max Rothchild, C. N. Beard and L. F. Brossard. Absent: Messrs. J. W. Robinson, C. J. Burke, John Dale and M. Kaufman. The Vice-President declared a quorum present and the Board proceeded to business. The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with. The Superintendent then read his report for the quarter ending December 31, 1919.

On motion duly seconded and carried Forty-five Dollars was allowed for a teacher for the Fairview School for the remainder of the session.

It was moved, seconded and carried that for the remainder of the session Third Grade teachers would receive \$60 per month and Second Grade teacher \$60 per month.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the contract for hauling the pupils to Monterey High School on the upper route for the last five months of this session and the first four months of the next session be awarded to Mr. S. B. Cross at \$80.00 per month, who was the lowest bidder on that route and the contract on the lower route be awarded to Mr. W. S. Burley at \$90.00 per month being the only bidder on that route.

On motion, duly seconded and carried the Police Jury was given permission to erect a building on the lower end of the Ferriday School lot to house the parish trucks.

On motion, duly seconded and carried that a school for colored children be established at Workingman's Bayou and the Superintendent was authorized to employ a teacher.

It was moved, seconded and carried that Mr. H. C. Sevier, Mr. E. C. Rhodes and the Superintendent be appointed to select a suitable lot and let the contract for a Rosewald school on Lake St. John not to cost more than \$1200.00.

It was moved, seconded and carried that where the colored people of any community raise \$800 to erect a two room Rosewald school the Board will appropriate a like amount.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the lease of school section near Canebake be released for four years at the expiration of the present lease on the same terms.

It was moved, seconded and carried Mr. I. E. Roberts be allowed \$100 extra on the Riverfield School building on account of the extra cost of getting the material on the ground caused by the rise of water in Brushy Bayou.

On motion duly seconded and carried the School Board was authorized through its President to borrow as much for the Fourth School District as it will be necessary to meet all requirements to put the Monterey High School in the Smith-Hughes Agricultural High School list.

On motion duly seconded and carried that the State Superintendent be asked to use his influence in bringing about such legislation that each School Board would be allowed to fix its own mileage and per diem for its members attending the session of the School Boards.

There being no further business the Board was adjourned.
