LACK OF ORGANIZATION.

We contend that in order for the citizens of our town to have any success fighting fires which occasionally visit our midsts, all the paraphernalia belonging to the reels and the fire department should be in its proper place.
 There seems to be a sad need of reorganization in the system now in vogue with the Vidalia fire department. What might have been one of the most disastrous fires of many years, was finally conquered by the valiant work of many Vidalia citizens Thursday night, when three buildings opposite the Vidalia Oil & Ice Co., Mill in the lower part of town were destroyed.
 When the alarm was sounded, the people, like sheep, ran pell mell, over each other to get there, when a little organization would have put them there all the sooner and the reels, nozzles, wrenches, etc., necessary to getting the water turned on the fire would have been properly looked after.
 Why don't they throw away some of the no-account wrenches that won't fit the fire plugs; buy a few proper size nozzles to fit the hose, and have a wrench that will fit, chained to each fire plug? At every fire, the same consternation—"The wrench won't fit," or "The hose is the wrong size,"—and the fire is raging all the while.
 Let's have a meeting—organize a volunteer department—give each man a specific post to go to at the first alarm, and all this energy will not be lost, when fire is threatening to destroy our property. It is time for us to quit expecting "George" to do it.

STUFF AND NONSENSE.

The Parkrites, grown frantic over the multiplying signs of their impending defeat, are making the most desperate attempts to break the force of Col. Stubb's drive against the Board of Affairs.
 As Senator Johnson, his relative and spokesman, said, the Board of Affairs amendment and the enabling act of 1916 were pet measures of Gov. Pleasant, and with the masses of the country people are up in arms against the Board. The Parkrites managers have been anxious to get under. Their latest effort takes the form of a silly plea to the county people that the storm against the Board of Affairs has been stirred up by the city organization in the hope of making the Board elective, so that it can control and reverse the cor-

porate interests of the State.
 Such a drive will hardly be at this stage of the game. The storm didn't brew in the city. It developed in the country when the small taxpayers began to pay their taxes, and found that while their bills were soaring the taxes of the corporations, under the beneficent operations of the Lee Thomas Board, were actually being reduced.
 It isn't the city, therefore, which is aroused against the Board of Affairs. It is the rural districts, which have been so painfully stung.
 Nor will the intelligent voter be scared by the pugaboo that the city organization wants the Board made elective in order to control it. The Board is now composed of one city member and two from the country, precisely as the Railroad Commission, of three members. If the amendment is changed, and the Board made elective it will provide as does the Railroad Commission, for two members from the country and one from the city, and the country always will have control and the city never.
 Mr. Parker sees his strength ebbing wherever the country people are suffering from by the manner in which the Gov. Pleasant's Board of Affairs has manipulated the assessing and taxing power. He and his managers are therefore, trying to invent scarecrows to distract attention from the State machine's responsibility for the Board. But the whole country is on, and the scarecrows have no power to frighten anyone.—N. O. States.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE POLICE JURY

The Police Jury of Concordia Parish, La., met at the Court House, in Vidalia, La., in regular session at 10 o'clock A. M., on the 12th day of January, 1920, and there were present the following members, to-wit:
 J. E. Burns, S. L. Winston, Dr. R. S. Carter, B. C. Brown, C. B. Godbold, R. S. Wilds and H. K. Moreland.
 Absent: J. W. Robinson and S. L. Maxwell. No member from the Third Ward.
 There being a quorum present, the President called the meeting to order, and the following business was proceeded with:
 The minutes of the previous meeting, upon motion duly seconded, were dispensed with.
 Concordia Parish, La., September, 1919.
 To The Honorable Police Jury, Parish of Concordia, La.
 We the undersigned respectfully petition your Honorable body to locate the new graveled Jonesville highway in approximately the same location as the present highway, between the iron bridge over Cross Bayou, and Frogmore station, instead of changing it to the new location proposed by the petitioners. The present highway runs straight west from the iron bridge, along Caney Bayou, to Brushy Bayou, then follows Brushy Bayou to Frogmore station; at Brushy Bayou it meets the road leading north to Lamarque and Clayton, and the road leading west to Glen and Gobeau. The new survey abandons all this present highway, and abandons the junction point with the roads leading north and west. It turns immediately after leaving the iron bridge, runs to the railroad, turns and follows the railroad to Frogmore station. The new survey would make the highway leave the high ground on the bayou bank, and run thru the lower ground along the railroad; the new survey would also compel everyone living north of Frogmore to go three-quarters of a mile further, over an improved road, to reach the graveled highway. We therefore suggest that the present highway is in the most serviceable, economical and desirable location.

 Mr. G. P. Bullis appeared before the jury, in the interest of the owners of Helena plantation, near Ferriday, La., and requested that upon the completion of the new highway, that the old road extending from the office of J. E. Ormsby to the levee, be abandoned, which the jury consented to do.
 Judge Hugh Tullia presented the following ordinance, which, upon motion of Dr. Carter, duly seconded, by Mr. R. S. Wilds was passed, as follows:
 Ordinance No. _____
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND RE-ENACTING SECTION TWO OF AN ORDINANCE OF THE POLICE JURY OF THE PARISH OF CONCORDIA, PASSED ON DEC. 12th, 1919, ENTITLED:
 "An ordinance of the Police Jury of the Parish of Concordia, State of Louisiana, creating the Vidalia Drainage District, defining and fixing the limits thereof, appointing three commissioners of said Vidalia Drainage District, fixing a time and place for the first meeting of the Board of Commissioners of said district, fixing a domicile for said Drainage District and for other purposes."
 BE IT ORDAINED, by the Police Jury of the Parish of Concordia, State of Louisiana, That,
 Whereas, in defining and fixing the limits of the Vidalia Drainage District as provided in section two of the ordinance, passed Dec. 12th, 1919, above referred to, certain errors in the descriptions of the property intended to be embraced within said Drainage District were inadvertently made, Now, therefore, in order to correct said errors, the said section two of said ordinance of December, 12th, 1919, be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows, to-wit:
 SECTION TWO: That the limits of the said Vidalia Drainage District be and the same are hereby fixed as follows, to-wit: The said Drainage District shall embrace the following

territory and lands and property, to-wit:
 1. All of the Fletcher plantation lying within the public levee; also part of section 49, in T. 7, N. of R. 9, E. containing 52 acres of land, lying contiguous to said Fletcher plantation and owned by W. Pasternack.
 2. All of the Sycamore plantation lying within the public levee.
 3. All of the Minors plantation lying within the public levee.
 4. All of the Teconey plantation lying within the public levee.
 5. All of what are known as Carter's Lake and River plantations, including that part thereof owned by Dr. Robert S. Carter, excepting, however, from said plantations those portions thereof which lie on the outside of the public levee.
 6. All of the plantations and lands now owned by Albert H. Gillespie adjacent to the Town of Vidalia, including that part of the Arnouldia plantation owned by said Gillespie, excepting, however, any part of said lands which may lie on the outside of the public levee.
 7. All that part of said Arnouldia plantation now owned by John T. Rountree which lies within the public levee.
 8. The tract of land owned by the late Chas. P. Beard, adjoining Whitehall plantation; also that tract of land owned by the late Chas. P. Beard and Mrs. Dora Beard, known as "Cosy Corners", excepting, however, from said lands all tracts any parts thereof which may lie outside of the public levee.
 9. All of the Whitehall plantation which lies inside the public levee.
 10. All of the Scotland plantation which lies inside the public levee, excepting 400 acres thereof lying on the South side of said plantation which is not to be embraced in said District.
 11. All that part of the tract of land which lies inside of the public levee now owned by the Louisiana & Arkansas Railroad Company, formerly part of the said Arnouldia plantation.
 12. That part of the main track of the Missouri Pacific Railway Company which extends from the inside, on land, base of the public levee in the Town of Vidalia, to the division line between the Concordia and Fletcher plantations.
 13. All of the side tracks of said Missouri Pacific Railway Company, lying on the land side of the public levee, and located along any part of track of said railway any point between said division line between said Concordia and Fletcher plantations and the inside base of said public levee in the Town of Vidalia; also all the side tracks of said railway situated within the limits of the said Town of Vidalia, or immediately adjacent thereto, forming part of the terminals of said railway at said Town of Vidalia, excluding, however, any part of tracks which may lie on the outside of said public levee.
 14. The repairs and said Missouri Pacific Railway Co., and one acre of land of which same are located and stand, in said Town of Vidalia.
 15. Eleven (11) acres of ground belonging to said Missouri Pacific Railway Co., adjoining the intersection of said Town of Vidalia, being depot site, together with any and all buildings and improvements thereon; also lots 14 and 15, in Square 5 and lot 1, in Square 6, and that part of the Gaither tract purchased by the vendors of said Missouri Pacific Railway Co., and now owned by it, from Mrs. V. E. Gaither which lies within the corporate limits of said Town of Vidalia, which lies within the public levee, and contains 45 acres together with any and all buildings thereon.
 16. All that part of said Gaither tract belonging to said Missouri Pacific Railway Company, lying within the said public levee, and outside the limits of the said Town of Vidalia and containing 95 acres, together with any and all buildings and improvements thereon.
 Hon. Jos. M. Reeves presented the following petition to the Police Jury, which, upon motion duly seconded was passed:
 To The Honorable Police Jury of the Parish of Concordia.
 The undersigned property tax payers respectfully petition your Honorable body to allow a public road beginning at Working Bayou Levee and running thru our lands to H. L. Evans.
 Signed as follows:
 L. L. Lanehart, S. C. Depriest, H. L. Evans, Chas. L. Evans, W. A. Cross Jr., G. D. Rivers, S. S. Watkins, Lee Lanehart.
 A committee of three, composed of Messrs. Lee Lanehart, W. A. Cross, Jr., and S. C. Depriest, were appointed by the jury to lay out the road mentioned in the foregoing petition presented by Mr. Reeves.
 The jury allowed the payment of \$25.00 to the Clerk of the Supreme Court of Louisiana, for filing fee in the Van Duff case.
 Messrs. Taylor, Wilkinson, B. W. Berry and M. L. Morris, were appointed a road committee in Ward No. 2, to take charge of the road work for said Ward, issue authorizations, etc.
 Upon motion of Dr. R. S. Carter, duly seconded by Mr. Burns, the President was authorized to secure, or purchase, land, and erect a sufficient shed thereon for the storing of road building trucks lately acquired by the Parish from the Federal Government.
 Upon motion duly seconded, the President and Secretary were authorized to sign contract for the building of a spur at Junks Mill, by the Missouri Pacific Railroad Co., for the purpose of unloading gravel to be used in the construction of good roads in this Parish, and they were authorized to issue a warrant for \$1575.00 therefor.
 Upon motion, duly seconded, the Police Jury accepted, as required by the laws of Louisiana, as security from the Canal-Commercial Trust & Savings Bank of New Orleans, La., for the appointment of said bank as depository for the funds derived from the sale of the Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000.00) Dollars five per cent (5%) road bonds, the following security:
 Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars in Liberty Bonds to be placed on deposit for the benefit of the Parish of Concordia, in the Trust Department of said bank.
 Upon motion duly seconded, the President and Secretary were authorized to deliver to the Canal-Commercial Trust & Savings Bank, the Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000.00) Dollars five per cent (5%) road bonds for par and accrued interest, plus a premium of \$25.00; said President and said Secretary were authorized to receive and cancel the One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars certificates issued by Ordinance No. 21.
 Upon motion duly seconded, the following ordinance was passed:
 Ordinance No. _____
SECTION 1. BE IT ORDAINED, by the Police Jury of Concordia

Parish, La.,
 That, that part of the Seventh Ward on Lake St. John, bounded on the North by the Tensas line and South by the Sixth and Seventh Wards, and running one and a half miles in depth, and being composed of the parishes of Bayou La Poudre, Upper and Lower Coosa, Spokane and a part of Innisfil, are HEREBY CREATED into a District, for the purpose of having a live stock law in said District.
SECTION 2. BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, ETC., That any person is authorized to seize, take up or confine, in a proper manner, all animals of the kind above described, found roving or running at large in said District, and shall have the right to make a charge of \$1.00 per head, per day, for taking up and giving notice to the owner, and for the care and keeping of said animals; any person so seizing, taking up or confining any of said animals, shall immediately notify the nearest Justice of the Peace, who shall immediately post at his office and at the Postoffices within the said District, a ten days notice of the impounding of any of said stock, with a description of same, and if the said live stock should be branded and brand known by the Justice of the Peace, he shall notify said owner. If after said ten days notice, the owner does not appear, or does not pay the penalty herein prescribed, and the costs, then the said Justice of the Peace shall sell, at public auction, if said stock sells for more than the impounding charge and costs, the remainder shall be returned to the owner by the Justice of the Peace, if the owner is known and if not known, shall be deposited in the hands of the treasurer until the owner is found.
 Upon motion duly seconded, Mr. R. S. Wilds was authorized to insert a siphon to drain water from the Wildsville road.
 On motion duly seconded, the jury ordered the Police Jury of the VIDALIA-DEERPAK road to be made at once, and immediately upon its completion, that the Black River road be surveyed. The Secretary of the Police Jury was instructed to get information and estimates for the installation of suitable steel shelving for the records.
 On motion duly seconded, Dr. W. M. Sigrist was allowed \$35.00 per month for office expense until April, 1920, it being understood that all inspectors were to be laid off until he was to perform what work might be required.
 The Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Bruce Swayze to pay \$100.00 due to the Parish of Concordia, for the ferry lease at Jonesville on Black River, between the Parish of Concordia and Catahoula, said payment having been due since Sept. 28th, 1919.
 The following petition was presented to the Jury, upon which, no action was taken at this time.
 To The Honorable Body of Police Jurors,
 Concordia Parish, Louisiana,
 Gentlemen:
 We the Citizens of this Parish hereby petition your honors in relative to the proposed highway that is now under consideration to allow us to propose a route, which we believe to be the most practical and convenient of the general public, the said route we now propose is to leave Black River at the Holmes Place thence a Southeast course to Horse Shoe Lake, thence following the lake to the mouth of the river, the greatest and most expensive to this route would be bridging the Cross Cocordia Bayou but even this we believe will be cheaper in the saving in grading and keeping up the road than any other way, besides this cuts off the loop, making the distance out to the main towns of Ferriday, Vidalia, and Natchez, Miss., and even times of an over flow this route is passable longer than any other dirt way, for all the people of the 10th. Ward and a great many of the 9th. We do believe this route to give greater service to the public than any other proposed route. As it will serve more people.
