AERIAL MESSAGES FROM CHERUBS.

Guy Empey's Great Orphanage Picture to Be Displayed Throughout the State, Beginning Thursday.

Shreveport, June 14.—The stage is set for the intensive week of the half million dollar expansion campaign for the Ruston orphanage drive. For the seven-day period beginning today Judge W. G. Banks, executive chairman; W. Scott Wilkinson, state chairman citizens' committee, and Judge Edward Barnett, chairman for Caddo and Shreveport, working in conjunction with Campaign Director George K. Nickerson, have prepared a program replete with novel features, full of human interest and bound to arouse the people of Louisiana to the call of the kiddies.



Today the ministers of the various churches in the respective districts of the state will press home the necessity of providing funds to construct a permanent home for 350 orphan children, and the Methodist Church is expected and will do its part in raising the necessary funds to provide adequate shelter for the 200 helpless dependent little ones who are now denied admission because of inadequate housing facilities.

Sunday night there was a mass meeting in Ruston, and a stereopticon exhibition. Ruston has already raised \$40,000 and expects to pass the \$50,000 mark Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday are to be devoted to personal solicitation of patriotic, benevolent citizens for financial aid in this great campaign, whose primary aim is to build citizens for tomorrow.

Thursday at noon a business men's luncheon is to be held at the Hotel Youree, to which 100 leading business and oil men have been invited. At this luncheon prominent speakers will picture the great need of the orphans, and demonstrate to business men that it is good business to aid and save the children.


Friday will be the day of days in the intensive week. At 5 p. m. Poll Perritt's Officers will meet the Ruston baseball club at Gasser Park. The Ruston band, the Ruston Chamber of Commerce and citizens of the town will invade Shreveport and root for the Ruston team and the Ruston orphanage. During the afternoon Guy Empey will make a trick ascent all over Shreveport, dropping the appeal of the kiddies from the clouds.

Friday night, in the city auditorium, Mrs. Climb Foster, prominent church and social worker, will act as chairman of 25 patronesses at a function which will include the premier presentation of Guy Empey's great orphanage film story. At this event the names of donors of big sums to the orphanage will be announced. Empey is booked to exhibit this great picture in Monroe Monday night, June 30, and in Homer June 22. Alexandria has granted the city hall for a mass meeting Thursday evening, June 24.

Full page "ads" during the week will convey a message to the people of the state to which every red-blooded man and woman will respond.


