ABOUT CHARBON.

The following is part of a letter received from Dr. Flowers, relative to the charbon and what to do.

"As a matter of fact we have found out that horses and mules, with any kind of anthrax vaccine, are extremely susceptible and harder to protect than cattle. In other words we believe, from our observation, that it requires at least fourteen days for protective effect to be expected in the cases of horses and mules and have advised a revaccination by the same method, which will perpetuate immunity wherever possible on horses and mules in an infected territory; from fourteen to twenty-one days thereafter; on the other hand, following personal observations, inoculations of our force and statistics from other territories, we are satisfied that satisfactory protection within a few days can be expected following the simultaneous inoculation in cattle. Another thing, with respect to the curative effects of the hyperimmune serum, we are satisfied that a maximum dose of 100 c. c. will almost invariably, in a very short while, demonstrate its curative effects upon cattle, conversely on horses and mules we find that they require from four to five times as much serum to produce curative effects as experienced in cattle from the 100 c. c. dosage.

"Unfortunately most of the inoculation this season were resorted to when the disease had already become pretty well established and especially during a season more favorable for the bacillary development of the organism than at any time for many years past. I would suggest revaccinating at this time on those plantations where the disease is still prevalent and where the animals are infected, additionally suggesting that you try Cutter simultaneous anthrax vaccine which we have found to be extremely potent and is giving excellent result."

As we have anthrax in every Ward and nearly ever community in Concordia Parish and we believe if Dr. Flower's advise is carried out that many mules and horses will be saved.

NOTICE TO OWNERS OF STOCK.

To leave the carcasses of dead animals improperly cared for, is not only unsanitary, but a serious menace to our health as well as to our live-stock. We are confronted with an epidemic of Charbon amongst our live-stock and unless something is done immediately to eradicate it most of them will become infected and in all probability we will have another outbreak next summer. Man, as well as animal, can be infected.

Realizing the seriousness of the epidemic I am asking the assistance and cooperation of every citizen of this Parish in preventing the spread of this disease. All dead animals should be cremated or buried immediately after death. All infected live-stock should be confined to lots or pastures.

The District Attorney authorizes me to say that he will ask the Court to impose the maximum penalty upon any person violating the law quoted below. As Parish Health Officer it will be my duty to report to him all such violations of this law.

ACT No. 194 OF 1918 OF LOUISIANA

AN ACT TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF ANTHRAX OR CHARBON, Glanders, Black Leg, Hog Cholera, Hemorrhagic Septicemia, and all other contagious or communicable diseases of cattle, horses, mules, hogs, goats and sheep, etc.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Louisiana, That in order to prevent, control and eradicate Anthrax or Charbon, Glanders, Blackleg, Hemorrhagic Septicemia, Hog Cholera and all other contagious or communicable diseases of mules, horses, cattle, sheep, goats, and swine; throughout the State of Louisiana, that the carcasses of all animal throughout the State of Louisiana be disposed of in a sanitary manner by cremation or deep burial; that burial in this sense means that such animal carcass must be placed in a hole or pit not less than six feet deep in the disposal of carcasses of cows, mules and horses, and not less than four feet as applying to carcasses of sheep, goats and swine. The owners, agents, firms or corporation, or persons in charge of any or all live stock on ranges, pastured, or other premises, throughout the State of Louisiana, shall be responsible for disposition of all carcasses in those herds over which they have jurisdiction, with reference to complying to the provisions of this act. The provisions of this act shall not apply to animal carcasses within the limits of a City or town which is provided with an incinerator or in which a rendering plant is operated, provided such incinerator or rendering plant is equipped with facilities to properly transport or handle carcasses in a manner to prevent dissemination of disease.

SECTION 3. Be it further enacted, etc., that it shall be unlawful for any owner or owners, person, firm or corporation, or agent in charge, to permit any animal or animals affected with, or have been exposed to Anthrax or Charbon Glanders, Blackleg, Hemorrhagic Septicemia, Hog Cholera, or any other contagious or communicable disease, to run at large or to go upon any public road or range. Said animal or animals must be kept on premises of owners, agent or person in charge of such animal, or animals, in proper enclosure until danger of infection has passed.

SECTION 3. Be it further enacted, etc., That any person or persons, firm or corporation wilfully violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$50.00 or in default thereof be imprisoned in the Parish jail for a term of less than Thirty days nor more than Sixty days, or both, at the discretion of the court.

SECTION 4. Be it further enacted, etc., That all laws or parts of laws in conflict with the provisions of this Act be, and the same are hereby repealed.
