FERRIDAY VS. L. & A.

Dear Sir:—Among the cases set for a hearing before the Railroad Commission of La. at Baton Rouge, on the 27th of July, is that of the Commission versus the L. and Ark. Ry. relative to a depot at or near Ferriday, La.

At the time the L. and A. purchased from the Iron Mountain that portion of their track from Concordia Junction to Black River, and leased from the Iron Mountain trackage rights over their line from Concordia Junction to Vidalia, the two railroad companies asked permission of the Railroad Commission to make the deal, which the Commission consented to with the proviso that they maintain as efficient service between points on that line as the Iron Mountain had previously maintained. On this run from Vidalia to Jonesville the Iron Mountain always ran their trains thru Ferriday, a distance of six tenths of a mile from Concordia Junction. On account of the order, sale and lease specifying service to and from Concordia Junction from Black River on the west and Vidalia on the East, the L. and A. Ry. discontinued its service into Ferriday. While the roads were under the control of the U. S. Government the service into Ferriday was restored, but soon after the roads were returned to private ownership it was again discontinued. Before the Railroad Commission issued any decision in this matter over two years ago, the L. and A. Ry. offered to erect a depot at Concordia Junction, provide an agent, and build a good gravel road from its depot into the Town of Ferriday, which offer the citizens of Ferriday rejected. This offer, we are informed, the L. and A. Ry. has since withdrawn. The citizens of Ferriday and the traveling public will, no doubt, be well represented at the hearing on the 27th.
