The town is having the ditches cleaned out, and the water is draining off the streets nicely. We want to congratulate the new council upon the progressive efforts they have made already. The electric pump has been running for the past week, and already an appreciable amount of water has been taken out of the slough. The protection levee above town across the slough was closed, and the water on this side is being pumped out, which will take it off the north part of the town.

Elsewhere in this issue appears Ordinance No. 211, of the Town of Vidalia, declaring war on dogs running at large in the streets. They will be shot without further notice. All citizens having valuable dogs, must see that they are kept up at all times.

The trial of the Ferriday election case was postponed until June 28th.

PROCEEDINGS TOWN COUNCIL

Special Meeting
Thursday, May 9, 1921.

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, La., met in special session at the Mayor's office in the Town Hall building this Thursday, May 19th, 1921 for the following purposes, to-wit:

To pass an ordinance, or to take such steps as the council may deem necessary to prevent dogs running at large within the corporate limits of the town.

To enact any suggested sanitary measures, and

To appoint a committee to investigate the condition of the Town Hall building, and to obtain plans and estimates of the cost of remodeling and otherwise improving the premises

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and on roll call the following members were found to be present, to-wit:

Hon. Phillip Hough, Mayor, Mrs. M. D. Boatner, G. P. Bullis, Walter McCrea, Chas. Moritz and G. A. Murray, Aldermen.

The full membership of the council being present the meeting was called to order by the Mayor and proceeded to business.

The condition of the Town Hall building was brought up for discussion and it being shown that the building is sadly in need of extensive repairs, the Mayor appointed a committee of three consisting of Mrs. M. D. Boatner, Chas. Moritz and G. A. Murray to obtain estimates of cost repairing, and remodeling the building and to report at the next regular meeting of the Board.

The matter of the danger of permitting dogs to run at large was next brought up and discussed at some length, Mr. Bullis called the attention of the Board to the fact that while in Ferriday he had witnessed a child being bit by a dog running at large in the town of Ferriday. The fact was mentioned of the number of

dogs running at large in the Town of Vidalia and it was the consensus of opinion of the Board that some measure was advisable to prevent the possibility of someone in Vidalia being bit by one of the army of canines now at large in the town.

At this stage of the proceedings Mr. Bullis was excused from further attendance at the meeting, as he was called away on urgent business.

The following ordinance was offered, and after being seconded, was adopted without amendments, to-wit:

ORDINANCE No. 211.

Be it enacted by the Mayor and members of the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, at a called meeting held for this purpose:

Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for dogs to run at large in the limits of the Town of Vidalia.

That from and after this date all dogs running at large within the corporate limits of the town shall be shot or otherwise destroyed by the Town Marshal or some one else authorized by the Mayor or the Marshal.

Section 2. Be It Ordained, etc., That the Marshal shall receive a fee of 50c for each dog killed and buried.

Section 3. That this ordinance shall become effective on and after 6 o'clock P. M., Friday, May 20, 1921.

Section 4. Be It Further Ordained, That all ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

This ordinance received the following votes:

Mrs. M. D. Boatner, Yea; Walter McCrea, Yea; Chas. Moritz, No; G. A. Murray, Yea. A majority being in favor of the ordinance it was declared adopted on this 19th day of May, 1921.

MR. GEORGE AND M. BRIAND

Open quarrels openly arrived might seem to be the revised "point" of Mr. Lloyd George and M. Briand. The former's speech in London had its swift riposte in the latter's interview with the press at Paris. After the embracing and swearing eternal friendship between the two premiers at Lympe and Hythe and the Chequer Court comes this long-distance exchange of epithets and defiances. Perhaps it is only one indication more of the great strain under which these statesmen had been laboring and of the resulting ease with which their tempers may be ruffled. But it is not an edifying exhibition.

The British prime minister was no doubt indiscreet at least in the tone of his speech. It can be no part of the foreign policy of England to make the French apprehensive and furious, as Mr. George has temporarily done. Yet he unquestionably had a definite purpose, as he usually has even when seeming most reckless in fluttering the dove cotes. Incidentally rubbing France the wrong way, his main intention must have been boldly to serve public notice upon Poland that she could not hope to gain by force and rioting more of the territory of Upper Silesia than she is entitled to under the Versailles treaty and the plebiscite of last March. And the same end, it is worth noting, is really subserved by the vigorous rejoinder of M. Briand. He, too, plants himself upon the treaty, and declares that France desires merely to see justice done under the terms.

Thus in the substance of the matter the two premiers are agreed. Their friction is over subordinate details, such as the possible use of German troops to put down the Silesian disorders, if they continue, and the use of German soldiers for that purpose should by all means be avoided.—New York Times.
