## THE WILDVILLE-NEW ERA HIGHWAY.

Editor Concordia Sentinel.

Dear Sir:—The Construction of the Wildville-New Era Highway appears to be the leading topic of conversation among the people of the ninth and tenth Wards; and, rightly should be as these people have had in the past such a poor way to reach our parish site. Some 8 miles in the ninth and 6 miles in the tenth Wards are now under course of construction and, after the Police Jury meets on the 5th of July and reestablishes around Horse Shoe Lake that part of this Highway that was ordered changed by the Police Jury at its last meeting, we will have under construction some 22 miles of this 32 mile highway. The public will remember that at the last meeting of the Police Jury a controversy arose as to the probable cost of building that part of this highway which goes around Horse Shoe Lake and Cross Bayou, as established by the Highway engineers last year; and, as this cost appeared to be too high the Jury ordered a survey of the route now used in "low water times" to be made and accepted as the most practical route, but after the engineers had made a partial survey they saw that this project was absolutely impracticable and too expensive and impossible to maintain, and, as a result, they condemned the route and recommended the re-establishing of the route as surveyed last year by the Highway engineers. The original survey around Horse Shoe Lake is one of the most beautiful to be seen in the state, and after this road is once built it will open up one of the most prosperous sections of the parish, and the sight-seeing and pleasure-seeking public will drive for miles to get a view of the scenery on this beautiful lake.

The width of this road has been cut down from 24 feet crown to 18 feet, in order to save money and this width will serve all purposes for the time being; but when it is continued into Avoyelles parish, which we hope will be in the near future, it can be made wider at very little additional cost. The actual grading of this road will approximate \$1,800 per mile.

That part of this highway between Silver Lake and Lum plantation known as the Tenth Ward "Forty Acre" road, measuring about one and one-eighth miles will soon be completed and then after the much needed bridge is built over Wildcow bayou, the public from there to the mouth of Black River can come to Monterey at all times except when the country is overflowed.

After this Highway is built the pleasure-seeking public from Vidalia and Natchez can come to Horse Shoe lake and Cross bayou and find one of the best fishing grounds to be found in either Louisiana or Mississippi, and Uncle William Cross will take great delight in showing them how to catch the different kinds of fish.

This list will be prepared by the Demonstration agent; so if you have anything you want to sell or are needing anything grown on the plantation or farms, please list same with me.)

## HOW ABOUT A FALL GARDEN.

With cotton selling below the cost of production, it becomes more necessary for all cotton planters to produce more of their living at home. The best paying plot on any farm is a well-cultivated garden, and there is no better place to grow vegetables than in Concordia parish. By planting a variety at the proper time and well cultivated, vegetables can be gathered from the garden 365 days each year in Concordia Parish. We make the following suggestions for the fall garden:

Earlina tomatoes planted late June and July; Royal king pepper planted late June and July; Copenhagen market, Henderson Succession or Chas. Wakefield cabbage planted August thru October; Crosby's or Egyptian beets planted in August thru October; Chantier or Crimson giant radish planted from August to April; purple top, globe or white egg turnip planted in August thru October; Bloomsdale spinach planted from October to April; Chinese mustard planted in August thru October; Big Boston lettuce planted in August thru October; Georgia collard planted in July thru October; white Vienna kohi rabi planted in August thru October; dwarf Long Island Brussels sprouts planted in July thru October; Curries rust proof (wax) beans planted in August; white star or triumph Irish potatoes planted early August and Lookout Mt. planted late July; Lucullus Swiss chard planted in July thru August; Creole onions planted in October and September; Creole garlic planted August to November; white shallots from August thru November; Early snowball cauliflower in August; white velvet okra planted in June and July; and Batavian broad leaved endive planted in August thru October.

The Louisiana Cauliflower Association, Baton Rouge, La., sell many of the varieties mentioned above practically at cost. Write them for prices.

Plant good seed. Do not plow under weeds or rubbish. Have the soil firmed by at least one good rain. Do not plant the seed too deep.



The "scooter" of the air seems about to become an accomplished fact we learn from Flight. A young French designer, M. Louis Goubert, has just completed the designs for a very small machine, which will be driven by an engine of only ten horsepower. The machine is to be a tractor, with the pilot entirely enclosed in the fuselage, which will be provided with windows. The wing loading is to be ten kilograms per square meter (about 2 pounds per square foot), and the maximum speed is estimated at 50 miles per hour. A model of the machine is, it is stated, to be tested by M. Eiffel before the actual machine is built.
