Art Criticism.


Arthur, age nine, returned from his first visit to the art institute with such a depressed air that his mother was puzzled.

LIGHTNING STRIKES NEGRO RIDING ROAD GRADER.

Isaac Jackson Strickler In Head by Bolt of Lightning and Instantly Killed.

Thursday afternoon, while he was operating the parish road grader on the Vidalia-Deerpark Highway, about three-quarters of a mile this side of Forest house, Isaac Jackson, a negro residing on Weecama Plantation, near Ferriday, was struck in the head by lightning, and rendered instantly unconscious, dying a few minutes afterward.

Mr. Gray, the Parish road overseer was standing nearby when the unfortunate man was struck, and lifted him out of his seat on the machine. There was a deep hole made in the dead man's head by the bolt, and it left black streaks down his body on the left side. Mr. Gray stated that the man lived fifteen or twenty minutes, but never was conscious.

His body was brought up to Vidalia where the Coroner, Dr. M. C. Reeves, made an examination of it and pronounced his death due to a stroke of lightning.

The hat worn by Jackson was torn literally into shreds, and his clothing showed marks of having burned.




