PROCEEDINGS SPECIAL MEETING POLICE JURY.

December 31, 1921

The Police Jury of Concordia Parish, La., met in the Court House in Vidalia, La., in special session at 10 o'clock a. m., Wednesday, the 31st day of December, 1921, at 10 o'clock and elected.

On motion duly seconded, the claim of Mr. P. C. Magoun to increase the road work done by Mr. Godwin to \$230.38 was rejected.

The petition of Messrs. Campbell, Pabb and Baumstafner to complete the Whitaker road was presented to the Jury, and no action was taken thereon. It was decided to have Mr. F. C. Groom present at the next meeting of the Police Jury, so that proper consideration could be given to the matter and to the matter of the claim of Mr. P. C. Magoun.

The special committee appointed to report on the Ike Watson claim for damages for Ferriday-Jonesville Highway right-of-way recommended rejection of the claim.

On motion, duly seconded, the Police Jury adopted the report of the committee.

Claim of Mr. J. M. Davis for \$26.00 for work done in the first ward was presented to the Jury and on motion, duly seconded, it was decided not to approve the claim as same was not approved by the Police Jury from that Ward.

On motion duly seconded the following supplemental budget was adopted:

On motion, duly seconded, the five mills heretofore levied for the payment of the road bonds was divided so as to apply 4 1/2 mills to the payment of the \$500,000.00 road bonds and one-half mill to the payment of the \$50,000.00 road bonds.

The report of the committee appointed to lay out the new road near Frigmore, La., was received and adopted, and the payment of damages assessed, ordered paid.

ROAD COMMITTEE'S REPORT

Whereas, on the 23rd day of October, 1921, a petition having been presented to the Police Jury of Concordia Parish, Louisiana, requesting that a public road be laid out, beginning at the Elk Horn Store and running south so as to intersect the Ferriday-Jonesville Highway at the nearest point, and

Whereas, a committee of six freeholders and inhabitants of Concordia Parish, namely, I. S. Hays, I. Anderson, Max Rothchild, Sam Calvert, Frank Adams and A. G. Taylor, is appointed by the Jury to lay out this said road, and after having taken the oath required by law, as follows:

"We, Max Rothchild, I. S. Hays, I. H. Anderson, Sam Calvert, Frank Adams and A. G. Taylor, do solemnly swear that we will lay out the road now directed to be laid by the Police Jury of the Parish of Concordia to the greatest ease and advantage to the inhabitants, and with as little prejudice to endlosures as may be, without favor or affection, malice or hatred, and to the best skill and knowledge. So help us God," laid out the road as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the Elk Horn Store in the Eighth Ward on Elk Horn Plantation, in Concordia Parish; thence running in a southerly direction so as to intersect the Ferriday-Jonesville Highway at the nearest and most convenient point. Said road shall be at least 50 feet wide and all cause ways must be at least 14 feet wide.

We find that _____ bridge _____ feet long and one culvert will be needed.

This report is respectfully submitted to your Honorable Body for ratification and approval, with the request that you appropriate means for the purpose of constructing said road and paying the damage assessed, which are as follows: \$95.00 (NINETY FIVE AND NO 100 DOLLARS) to all enclosures.

On motion duly seconded, the amount allowed the Fisher family as a pension was reduced to \$10.00.

On motion duly seconded, the President was authorized to pay the Baxter Lumber Company bill for lumber for road work when presented and approved by Mr. Wilds.

Mr. B. C. Brown reported that he had made a visit to the State Highway Department and was in consultation with Mr. Bule who promised to write letter to the Police Jury, approving the construction of the Ferriday-Jonesville Highway.

There being no further business the jury adjourned.
