THE RESULT OF THE NORTHERN ELECTIONS.

When our readers looked over our election despatches yesterday many of them were much surprised at the result. We were agreeably astonished at New York. We expected the State to go Democratic, but we thought it would be by very small figures. It is exceedingly gratifying, that the victory is a decisive one. There is no longer room to doubt that the State is reliably Democratic whenever there is a real party fight. There was such a one Tuesday. The Republicans had the aid of all the Mugwumps, and the Democrats were sustained by all their factions. It was a square party fight, and the victory is a party victory. All the Civil Service Reformers, that is, those who claim to be better than partisans, and who dream there are better methods than party methods, were on the Republican side and went down with Davenport.

It will be remembered that the Democrats in their State convention spoke out in favor of party and party methods. They did not gush over the fact that Republicans are kept in office by a Democratic Administration, but used plain terms, that the people understand and appreciate. They appealed to the people to endorse the Democratic party by the election of a Democratic Governor, and they did it positively and gloriously.

The result proves that the people are satisfied with a Democratic President and with the Democratic party. The Mugwumps may be able to lay the law down to their own party, but they are not powerful enough to defeat the united Democracy.

JEFFERSON COUNTY.

The county does not owe a dollar and has some \$3,000 in hard cash in the treasury.

The real and personal property is assessed at (in round numbers) \$1,250,000, but it is believed that a fair assessment would swell the assessable values of the county to \$2,500,000.

The State tax is, as everybody knows, 2 1/2 mills on the dollar. The county tax is 15 mills, and the entire tax for State and county purposes is 17 1/2 mills on the dollar.

Within the last six years a new court house, costing \$15,000 has been built, while \$4,000 has been spent in improving and strengthening the county jail. In addition the county has lost, within the same period of six years, ten or twelve thousand dollars by the defalcation of two Sheriffs.

RAYMOND, Miss., Nov. 4.—All the precincts in Hinds county and voting wards have been heard from and canvassed by the commissioners. The highest vote cast was for S. B. Thomas, for Sheriff, he having received 1,482 votes. The other candidates for county officers fell a few votes short. Only fifteen per cent of the voters cast their ballots yesterday in the several precincts.

BUFFALO, Nov. 4.—Davenport's majority in Erie county complete, is 2,142. Remaining districts to be heard from may increase it 250. McMillan, Republican, for State senator, is elected by 1,500 majority. The Republicans elect three members of the assembly and the Democrats two. This is a gain of one assemblyman for the Republicans.

ELMIRA, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Chemung county, complete, gives Davenport 4,449, Hill 5,797, Bascom 16. Bush, Democrat, is elected to the assembly.

BINGHAMTON, Nov. 4.—Broome county, complete, gives Davenport 6,405, Hill 5,029, Carr 6,265, Jones 5,730.

ALBANY, Nov. 5.—Albany city, complete, gives Davenport 9,116, Hill 11,348. The Evening Journal estimates 20 Republican and 12 Democratic senators, and 74 Republican, 52 Democratic and 2 Independent assemblymen are elected.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Complete and corrected returns from the city of Brooklyn and Kings county makes Hill's majority in that county 8,687. A very few returns from the interior of the State have been received this morning, but everything indicates that Hill's majority will be between 12 and 15,000. The senate and assembly will both be strongly Republican.

OSWEGO, Nov. 4.—Oswego county, complete, gives Davenport 8,760, Hill 5,924.

TROY, Nov. 4.—The complete returns from Rensselaer county gives Davenport 12,244, Hill 13,315; Hill's majority 1,071.

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Davenport's majority in Orange county is 249.

DELEW, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Delaware county, complete, gives Davenport 5,589, Hill 4,451.

BATH, N. Y., Nov. 4.—Steuben county, complete, gives Davenport 1,386 plurality.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Montgomery county, nine-tenths of the county filed with the county clerk give Hill 5,040, Davenport 4,788.

Virginia.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 4.—Additional returns do not change the indications telegraphed last night as to Gen. Lee's majority reaching 25,000 and it may go to 30,000; as to the legislature, sufficient returns have been received to show that the Democrats have already 62 of the 100 members of the house of delegates, and 23 out of the 40 members of the senate. The Republicans have 16 members of the house and 11 senators. The counties yet to hear from will increase the Democratic membership to two-thirds majority in both houses.

HARRISONBURG, Va., Nov. 4.—Full returns from this county give Wise 140 majority; total vote 5,889, the largest ever cast.

STAUNTON, Va., Nov. 4.—Rockingham county gives a Republican majority of 15; elects two Republican members of the legislature instead of Democrats. Rockbridge elects two Democratic members by 125 majority. The Republicans carry Allegheny county by 213 majority and elect the legislative ticket.

Bath county gives 110 Democratic majority. Highland, a mountain county, has not been heard from. Last year it gave a Democratic majority of 47. Should that vote be maintained the Republicans will carry the senatorial district composed of Highland, Bath and Allegheny counties by 56. In the counties above named the vote is about the same as for Cleveland last year.

STAUNTON, Nov. 4.—Augusta county gives Lee 193 majority, a Republican gain of 109. The Democratic legislative ticket is elected by 850 majority. The district of Highland, Bath and Allegheny were also carried by the Republicans, a gain of one representative.

Illinois.

CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—Returns this morning show that the new election law has been adopted by a majority of from 13,000 to 14,000.

The non-partisan candidate for the vacancy on the supreme bench received nearly all the votes cast. Gwynn Garnett, Republican candidate for judge of the superior court, has about 5,000 majority over Hynes, Democrat. Two Republican and two Democratic county commissioners were elected.

The daily press here, without exception, view with satisfaction the result of the election law framed to meet the popular demand in this city, while the Democratic county convention declared against the adoption of the law. It appears to have been voted for very evenly by both parties, as out of the total vote recorded of 45,000, 30,000 votes were cast for the adoption of the law. The new statute provides for small polling districts and necessitates a canvass of each precinct prior to each election; allows none but registered voters to cast their ballots; makes it the duty of serving as election judge as imperative as that of a pettitor, and fixes the hour for closing the polls at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. This latter feature was the one upon which the opposition to the law was based. The law also makes every election a holiday.

The Republican candidate for justice of the supreme court was endorsed by the Democrats and met with no opposition. The Republican candidate for the superior court was elected. Two

Republicans, two Democrats and one independent were elected as county commissioners, the highest securing less than 25,000 and the lowest 23,000.

Maryland.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 4.—Sufficient returns of the election held yesterday have been received to indicate that the majority for the Democratic State ticket will be nearly 30,000. The legislature will be about: Senate, Republicans 6, Democrats 20. The house of delegates, Republicans 16, Democrats 101. The Democratic majority on joint ballot is 98, assuring a Democratic successor to Senator Gorman, whose term will expire on the 4th of March, 1887.

DES MOINES, Nov. 4.—The Republican State committee claim the State for governor by 12,000, and twenty-four majority in the legislature on a joint ballot with several districts in doubt, which they will not concede to Fusionists. The Democratic State committee claim from private dispatches received by them that the State ticket is in doubt, and if same ratio of gain as already indicated in their private dispatches continues they have carried the State for Whiting. They claim he is running ahead of the ticket by several thousand. They claim to have carried the house, and have a majority on joint ballot, with the senate in doubt. Four hundred and forty precincts gave Larrabee 59,415, Whiting 55,061, Republican net gain of 1,474.

The Register has returns from two-thirds of the State, it puts the Republican majority on the State ticket at 14,090. Its returns show that the Republicans will have 56 of 100 members of the house, and 30 of 50 members of the senate.

PORT GIBSON, Nov. 4.—The election yesterday in this county was quiet. A very light vote was polled. The entire Democratic ticket was elected. Lowry's vote and majority was four hundred and seventy-two.

An Incident of a Vexatious Nature.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—An incident of a very vexatious nature occurred last evening at the Academy of Music, just before the Thomas' concert commenced. Mr. Thomas recently hired a musician in Europe, but by the laws of the New York Musical Protective Union, none but members of that body shall be admitted into any local band. Last evening Mr. Thomas was at his post, and the orchestra in readiness to march upon the stage, when a notification was served upon him that a fine of \$10 would be imposed upon each member of the band that took part in the performance in which a non-member of the Union was engaged. Several of the musicians, thereupon, declined to play and left the academy at once. There appeared a likelihood at first that the concert would not be given, but the difficulty was settled by Mr. Thomas promising to pay all fines imposed, amounting in this case to \$750. Should the new musician appear in Thursday's concert, Mr. Thomas will be fined \$20 for each of his men, and at the third offense will be visited upon all parties by expulsion from the Union.

NEW YORK World and Times Tuesday's Election.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The World in commenting upon the result of yesterday's election says: "What does the Democratic victory mean? It means first of all that the Democrats of New York are once more united. Thousands of Democrats who last year were repelled by doubts of Mr. Cleveland's Democracy and Republican journals that supported him, have all returned to the fold. It means too that they have returned to the party almost entirely for the very reasons that Gov. Hill was known to be a true, genuine, old-fashioned Democrat, who had the opposition of the Mugwumps and did not enjoy the favor of Mr. Cleveland. It means an expression of party belief that Mr. Cleveland probably means well, and that the mistakes he has made are due to inexperience, an excessive self-reliance, gross flatteries and hero worship of Mugwump journals and their false light and leading. It means above all that the fact that Gov. Hill was a representative of the real Democracy, and not of sham Mugwump Democracy secured his election by a majority probably fifteen or twenty times greater than the State gave Cleveland last year. This is the lesson of the election. The hope of the election is that the lesson will be understood and heeded on at Washington. Farewell Mugwumps, farewell!"

The Times says: "There is one urgent reason why the story of yesterday's election should be read in a light of facts, which account for its most untoward result. That the election of Hill was a distinctly reactionary step must be admitted, but it was a step taken in consequence of follies and blundering worse than follies of leaders of the party opposing Hill, and not through an incurable adherence to bad political theories and methods. One fact which stands out prominently is that the Republicans organized their own defeat. They began work at Saratoga when the convention adopted resolutions which were an affront to the intelligence of the sober members of the party and a direct insult to thousands independent men of both Democratic and Republican antecedents, whose votes were so vitally necessary to success; bitter partisanship of unreasoning Republican organs and ceaseless reviling of the president gave a fatal check to the process of Republican recruitment. If the evil results of Mr. Hill's election could be confined to this State there would be no serious occasion to fear for stability of reforms already incorporated in the laws of the land, but as we have already pointed out the triumph of the candidate of the president's enemies in the most important State in the Union will immeasurably increase the influence of the spoils-seeking crowd, and will subject the president to a pressure far greater than that which he has thus far successfully resisted. If his difficulties and his perplexities increase beyond even his tremendous powers of endurance he will scarcely find consolation in the reflection that his own vote however reluctantly given contributed to the result."

PENNSYLVANIA.

THE Republicans Carry the State by a Large Majority. PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 3.—The county election centered on the contest for sheriff, W. Elwood Rowan being the Republican and Dallas Sanders the Democratic candidate. Rowan was opposed by the citizens committee of one hundred, which has been so prominent in local elections for some years, on the ground that he was a representative of machine politics. Rowan in 1876 was defeated for sheriff by Wright, Democrat, by 7,264 votes, although the Hayes electors on the same day received 15,000 majority.

Returns so far received indicate the election of Jany, Republican, for state treasurer, by an increased majority.

CONNECTICUT.

LARGE Democratic Gain in the Legislature of Hartford.

HARTFORD, Nov. 3.—Returns from fifty towns in the State election 37 Republicans and 39 Democrats members of the legislature, a Democratic gain of six over last year, when the Republicans had 71 majority in the house.

HARTFORD, CONN., Nov. 3.—133 towns elect 109 Republicans, 92 Democrats, 1 Greenbacker and 1 Independent.

From returns thus far received, the Inter Ocean figures that the city election law is undoubtedly carried. Other authorities are not so certain. It looks as though the Democrats are gaining ground where the county commissioners are concerned. The returns are now about half received.

A Disastrous Collision.

TALLADEGA, ALA., Nov. 4.—A disastrous collision occurred on the East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia railroad, twenty-five miles south of here last night. Thirteen cars were wrecked, several piled upon each other, and a torn almost into splinters. Four men were badly injured, one dying soon after the accident. The debris is not yet cleared away.
