A tall chimney fell upon a factory full of operatives, chiefly women and children, at Bradford, England, on the 28th, killing thirty-six and wounding fifty.

Josephine Meeker died in Washington on the 30th ult. Her father, N. C. Meeker, was one of the victims of the Ute Indian atrocities in Colorado in 1879.

America received one Christmas present, at least, for which the people can be thankful. Oscar Wilde rid the country of his presence, sailing for Europe on the 23rd.

Albuquerque officers are endeavoring to capture a gang of bunco steers at Wallace, but are not meeting with brilliant success. The criminals have friends who keep them posted.

Clarence Whistler, the champion wrestler of this country, will match John Graham, the champion heavy weight wrestler of England, at Kansas City during the month of January, for \$1,000.

The mining men of Grant county are taking steps for the organization of a mining association and protective union. There is something practical about this that is not to be found with most mining associations.

F. F. Delaney, of the Gramercy athletic club of New York, a young man unknown to fame, beat the English champion George, in a ten mile race recently, and made the best time for that distance on record in America, being 56.07 minutes.

The celebrated suit in the case of the Tam O'Shanter mine in Pitkin county, Colorado, has finally been decided in favor of Governor Tabor. The group of mines in question are supposed to be among the richest in the state.

Last Sunday's Albuquerque Journal had its first page filled with a resume of the current events of the year just passed in that city. The paper of this issue was ten pages size and was probably the largest paper ever printed in New Mexico.

A bunco steerer in New York captured Oscar Wilde for \$1,000 on the lottery ticket dodge. Oscar gave his check for his losses and stopped payment at the bank, so he was really nothing out except in that he found he was not so sharp as he thought he was.

Pat Hackett, a section boss at Maxwell, Colfax county, on the day following Christmas shot and killed a Mexican named Arellano. He went to Raton and gave himself up, and is now in the Springfield jail. It is supposed that the deed was perpetrated in a drunken row.

A man named Santa Cruz Smith shot and killed William Burr at the town of Organ, says the Las Cruces Republican, but there being no officer there the murderer was not arrested. It is a sad state of affairs when there is not a peace officer on the east side of the Rio Grande in Dona Ana county.

Company A, second regiment volunteer guards at Socorro has been reorganized, and new officers have been appointed and commissioned for the company as follows: Captain, E. W. Eaton; first lieutenant, Geo. H. Sowers; second lieutenant, Jas. J. Leeson. The company number fifty men.

At an entertainment given by the Ford brothers in Boston, some of the crowd jeered them when the boys drew their revolvers and jumped into the midst of the audience, striking right and left. The lads were arrested, but they ought not to have been. The people who will pay money and give their time to see these nincompoops ought to be cracked on the skulls with forty-fivers, and cracked hard.

The commission of Col. S. M. Barnes, United States district attorney, expired on the 12th inst. His successor has not yet been appointed. There are six applicants. Col. Barnes desires reappointment, Col. G. W. Pritchard of Las Vegas and W. B. Sloan of Santa Fe would like the position. The other three hail from Illinois, New York and Pennsylvania respectively. The office is said to pay about \$4,000 a year now, and the delay in filling it denotes that a lively fight is in progress for the place.—Alb. Review.

Hadley's Pointers of Las Vegas prints a map of the Black Range. It looks like a Turk-Russian war map and

would apply to almost any other country as well as this. It was especially designed to represent the Perchas and Lake Valley districts, and it has these locations down approximately correct but when it adds this end of the range it displays unbounded ignorance. On the map Robinson lies in the midst of mines while Chloride has timber only. The road to Engle goes around the north end of the Fra Christofal mountains, making the distance about two hundred miles, and other errors are as numerous as they can well be. It seems strange that a person should attempt to construct a map of a country of which he has so little knowledge as the builder of that map has of this.
