The Cotton Worm Question.

The liberality and enterprise of the merchants and cotton dealers of Waco in providing for poison to be supplied to farmers at prime cost, for the purpose of destroying cotton worms, is to be applauded. The farmers have passed through two years of short crops and are in a bad condition to sustain the heavy expense necessary to protect the abundant cotton crop now promised them. The worms have already made their appearance in several localities, and soon we may look to hear of them spreading in every direction.

Now, while the News commends the liberality of our people in furnishing poison at cost, it is appropriate to note the action of the citizens of Temple in the same line. At that place a syndicate of merchants and cottonmen, including nearly every one in business in that town, to supply to the farmers of the whole of Bell county London purple, arsenic or Paris green FREE. Mark, this does not apply to any restricted territory immediately adjacent to Temple but covers all of a county filled with thousands of cotton raisers. If it is profitable for a city of 5000 people and receiving from 12,000 to 15,000 bales of cotton will it not be much more profitable for a city of 25,000 and receiving 75,000 bales of cotton? We think so. Bell county is, to-day, flooded with circulars and other printed matter bringing the attention of farmers to the generous offer of the citizens of Temple. Let Waco go a step further and supply poison free! The increased yield of cotton will make it a profitable move.

A Big Shoot.

The members of the gun club put in nearly an entire day shooting yesterday, at the Proctor Springs grounds at the end of the street car track. There were ten matches, all of them closely contested. The scores are as follows:

First Shoot; 10 glass balls, Garland 8; Prewitt 2; Massey 4; Coke 4; Lipscomb 8; Franklin 10. Franklin first money, Lipscomb second.

Franklin first money after a remarkably finely contested tie shoot between himself and Cresap. They shot 7 times, the last time at 31 yards rise, Franklin making a score and Cresap missing. Garland took second money.

Fifth Shoot; 5 blue rocks: Garland 5; Massey 4; Cresap 2; Franklin 4. Garland first money, Franklin second.

Sixth Shoot; 3 pair doubles, 1 blue rock and 1 glass ball; Cresap 3. Garland 5; Massey 1; Franklin 4; Lipscomb 4. Garland first money, Lipscomb second.

Seventh Shoot; 1 glass ball and 1 blue rock, 5 pairs; Cresap 4 and Garland 3 pair straight, rendering it unnecessary for him to shoot beyond the first three pair.

Eighth Shoot; 20 glass balls, \$3 entrance: Coke 8; Cresap 9; Franklin 18; Garland 15; Brown 12; F. Henderson 13; Lipscomb 14; Wilcox 8; L. Henderson 10; Massey 11; Winter 7; Joney Jones 13. Franklin first money, Garland second and Lipscomb 3.

Ninth Shoot; 3 pairs, 1 glass ball and 1 blue rock; Cresap 2; Lipscomb 3; Garland 6; Massey 2; Franklin 4; Turner Hubby 4; Brown 4; L. Henderson 0. Garland first money, Hubby second after shooting off a tie.

Tenth Shoot; ten glass balls; Garland 6; Franklin 8; Hubby 6; Massey 7; Brown 9. Brown first money, Franklin second and Massey third.

LOOK AT HOME.

Some Account of a Great and Growing School.

The music and art departments in this school are especially worthy of notice, both are acquiring a State reputation and adding to the scholarship. The question before the board of trustees just now of most pressing importance is not where shall we get scholars but what shall we do with boarding scholars with the present facilities until enlarged facilities can be had.

They will meet the emergencies this year, but next year will see new, grand buildings. While the state reputation of the college is filling the boarding department, the Waco patronage, though very good, is not as large as it should be, even considering what a grand factor this institution has been in the history of the city. It was the nucleus of a city. Waco has been built around the college as a starting point. Even in this point of view, the school should be crowded with Waco students, but that point may readily be waived. The Waco Female College has no superior in the country for a symmetrical, thorough and complete education. The young lady graduates of this school in all that pertains to lady-like accomplishments and mental attainments, can stand side by side with the daughters of institutions making greater pretense as equals at all points. This leads us to this conclusion, and we desire to press it with force. The young ladies of Waco should all be educated at Waco Female College. There are advantages in home education, which will readily suggest themselves to parents. There is equally an advantage in uniform education, and the education in one school from childhood to a graduate, has a merit which teachers can readily understand. If the Waco Female College could be seen as it really is, and the people of Waco correctly appreciated the merits of this great school as the public of the state does, the home patronage, which is already liberal, would be doubled, tripled and quadrupled. We advise our home people who have daughters to educate, to canvass the merits of the Waco Female College. It is a school without a superior.
