A TRAIN HELD UP

On the Southern Pacific—Robbers Receive a Warm Reception.

Schulenberg, Tex., Sept. 23.—When passenger train No. 19 on the Southern Pacific road was two or three miles east of Harwood this evening at 7:20 p. m., the engineer was signaled to stop, which he did.

Immediately the engineer stopped a broad shouldered man with chin whiskers and mustache boarded her and covered the engineer with a vicious six-shooter.

Another man with smooth face and apparently not over twenty-two or twenty-three years old leveled a revolver on the firemen and ordered him to go back and uncouple the express car from the remainder of the train.

Before the captor and captive had reached the express car Conductor Shackford, who was in charge of the train, came up and asked what was the matter. "We want the car," said the bearded man, pointing his pistol at Shackford, "and we want it quick. Come, stir yourself, and uncouple it," continued he, holding his vicious weapon in such range that one discharge would kill the fireman and conductor.

The fireman then uncoupled the main car, as ordered, and the engine pulled it down the road about two miles, leaving the express car, two coaches and two sleepers behind with no one to guard them.

"Keep still and hide your valuables," advised Conductor Shackford walking through the cars. "Thieves have got us."

"What's got us?" was screeched out of scores of throats at once.

"Train robbers," laconically replied the conductor.

"My God! I felt like something was going to happen when I got on the train, murmured big men as they crouched in the seats in apparent effort to smother themselves in the benches.

Bang, bang, bang, fourteen times comes ringing back from the direc-

tion in which the engine had rumbled away a few minutes previously.

Bud West and J. S. McNeil were in the mail car and shooting at the robbers. When the fusillade had ceased and the bandits fled, it was discovered that the engineer, Dan Toomey, had been wounded. Two or three of the robbers were also limping off, beseeching their fleeing companions not to desert them.

In the express car which the robbers undoubtedly meant to cut off there was United States Marshal Jno. T. Rankin with Deputy Van Riper and Detective Jay G. Kelly, of the Southern Pacific service. The train men had observed suspicious movements along the road between Houston and San Antonio since Tuesday and Wednesday and had communicated their suspicions of an attempt at robbery to Marshal Rankin who had been guarding all the east bound trains with the corpse of deputies since Wednesday. Information perfectly reliable reached the marshal Saturday morning that the train was to be held up Saturday night, consequently he was fully prepared for it when the train left San Antonio at 4:25 p. m. to-day. Marshal Rankin, Deputy Van Riper and Detective Kelly went out on the express with Winchester and double-barrel shotguns.

A Bloody Fight.

Houston, Sept. 23.—News has reached the city from the line of the Texas Western Narrow Gauge Railroad of a bloody affray that occurred about forty miles from here, in which two section hands and a section boss, Tom Hall, took an active part. It seems that a row was started between the two section hands, and when one struck the other with a spike hammer the section boss, Tom Hall, rushed in to stop the difficulty. He was turned upon, and had he not used a long-bladed knife, he would have been badly done up. As it was he drew the knife and cut his assailant across the abdomen, letting out his bowels, but not cutting them. The injured man was taken in hand and his wounds

Railroad Accident.

San Antonio, Tex., Sept. 23.—The north bound passenger train on the Aransas Pass railway was wrecked last night six miles this side of Comfort, Kerr county, by running over a cow. The passenger coach was thrown down an embankment and Mrs. Crawford Long of San Antonio mashed into a pulp and Mr. Logan was seriously injured. The railroad officials here have endeavored to keep the matter dark as long as possible. It is impossible at this hour to obtain the names of the other people injured. It is pretty well settled however, that Mrs. Long was the only one killed. The names of the engineer and conductor of the train are not known.

Judge Gustave Cook Resigns.

Galveston Sept. 22.—Judge Gustave Cook, Judge of the criminal district, has tendered his resignation to take effect Oct. 1. Governor Ross has accepted it and appointed Honorable Charles L. Cleveland, of this place to fill the vacancy. The new Judge is now absent on a bridal tour, having recently wedded one of Kentucky's daughters. Judge Cook has been threatening to resign for two or three years past. His health is so precarious that it often interferes with his duties. Judge Cleveland brings to the bench ripe experience, a thoroughly trained judicial mind, and a character above reproach.

Another White Chapel Murder.

London, Sept. 23.—The body of the young woman who was found laying out of doors at Gateshead this morning giving evidence of having been murdered by some methods employed by the White Chapel butcher, and presumably is another one of his victims. Great excitement prevails in the vicinity.

Assassinated.

Milican, Tex., Sept. 23.—Mattie Leonard, a young man who had just opened an eating house here yesterday, was foully assassinated last night while sitting in the window of his place of business. No clew as yet to the assassins, though the officers will leave nothing unturned to find who the murderer is. Leonard was raised in this vicinity and generally bore a good reputation. He has only one relation, a sister, living in Austin. His remains were given a decent burial by his friends in the Catholic grave-yard to-day.

A Bridegroom Killed.

Wills Point, Sept. 23.—D. J. Fuller, who lives eight miles north of here, killed a young man named Ingram to-day. Reports say that Ingram had run away with and married Fuller's daughter. Fuller was on the hunt for them and met them to-day in the road and a difficulty arose between them, resulting as above.
