## PERMANENT ORGANIZATION.

Proceedings of the Meeting Last Night. Preparations for Monday.

The meeting for the purpose of perfecting the organization of the Central City Democratic club was largely attended at the court house last night. Chairman R. H. Rogers called the meeting to order and at once announced a recess to enable new members to enroll their names, some 72 new names were added.

When the club was again called to order, a motion was made and carried that the club proceed to the election of permanent officers, to consist of a president, five vice-presidents, a secretary, recording secretary and treasurer.

Mr. A. J. Caruthers placed in nomination for president R. H. Rogers Esq., T. A. Blair put the vote and Mr. Rogers was declared unanimously elected.

On motion of R. H. Kingsbury it was decided to elect a vice-president from each ward. The following were elected vice-presidents: First ward, C. C. Metcalloch; Second ward, Wm. Edmonds; Third ward, J. C. West; Fourth ward, Wm. Evans; Fifth ward, F. M. Makeig. T. A. Blair was elected corresponding secretary; John R. Lunsford recording secretary; Capt. M. E. McLaren, treasurer. Capt. T. A. Blair in response to a call from the club made a stirring and eloquent speech.

R. H. Kingsbury Jr., was next called on and warmly advocated the re-election of Roger Q. Mills and the triumph of Democratic principles.

Col. John G. Winter, next responded briefly and said that all who are not with Democracy in this fight are against it, no matter under what guise they fight.

The chairman announced that Hon. S. B. Maxey will speak in the district court room on Monday night, Oct. 1st, and Hon. J. W. Baily will speak on Thursday next, October 4th.

On motion of J. V. Smith, a committee of three on constitution and by-laws was appointed as follows: J. V. Smith, Wm. Edmonds, John G. Winter.

Capt. Blair stated that badges for the delegates were prepared and chairmen of the respective county delegation could secure a badge for each member of his delegation by calling on Judge W. W. Evans.

The club then adjourned to meet again at 8:30 Monday night to hear Hon. S. B. Maxey speak.
