CROOKED TICKETS.

The Independents Get Out a Counterfeit Ticket.

The Jonesites, or the independents (self-styled) are preparing to work a fraud on the voters of McLennan county. A fraud which should be scorned by these immaculately pure(?) gentlemen who pretend to be so much better than Coke, Mills, Ross, Bonner and Maxey. Under the superintendence and direction of their central committee, they are printing, and have printed, election tickets which they propose to shove off on unsuspecting democrats. These tickets are being printed in Waco, and are made out for McLennan, Falls, Bell, Limestone and Milam counties. They are labeled "Democratic Ticket," and at the top have printed in large type, the names of Grover Cleveland for president, and Allen G. Thurman for vice-president. The rest of the ticket contains the electors, state ticket county ticket and precinct ticket in small type. All the names are regular democratic nominees, except congressman, and there instead of Roger Q. Mills appears the name of E. A. Jones in small type, sandwiched between Judge White of the court of appeals, and Judges Dickenson and Rice. If no fraud was intended, why was this ticket not labelled Independent, Anti Mills, or Home Market; but it is intended to be palmed off as the straight democratic ticket. Voters, be careful, and read your ticket clear through. Do not permit yourselves to be defrauded of your ballot by such a trick as this.

The other morning no less than 500 dead birds were picked up at the base of the statue. Twenty-five distinct species were counted. Nearly all of them were small, and most of them were "yellow" birds. A red-headed woodpecker, two cat birds and several English sparrows were among the slain.

A Remarkable Reason for Suicide.
Greensburg, Pa., Oct. 22.—A most peculiar case of suicide occurred here last night. Two domestics working at the residence of Mrs. T. J. Barclay and her son-in-law, Dr. J. S. Crawford, mutually agreed to commit suicide for the reason that neither of them had fashionable clothes. Last evening they visited four different drug stores and purchased in all forty five cents' worth of laudanum. It was decided to take the deadly drug this evening.

Their names were Cora Lloyd and Maggie Galvin, of this place. When the latter left Miss Lloyd last evening it was understood that the act would not be committed until this evening. To Miss Galvin's surprise Miss Lloyd was found dead in bed this morning. She was about twenty years of age. Miss Galvin told the story of the compact, but says that she will not follow her companion.
