WACO FEMALE COLLEGE.

Meeting Last Night—Enthusiasm Increased Prospects of Success.

There was a very good attendance last evening at the chapel of Waco Female College to attend the meeting in the interest of that institution. The audience was entertained for several minutes at the commencement of the program by songs executed in chorus by ten young ladies under the directorship of Mrs. Rounsavall. Following this, Gen. Felix H. Robertson introduced Bishop Joseph S. Key, of Macon, Ga. The Bishop delivered a most entertaining address of about an hour upon the subject. He said that his home, Macon, was the seat of learning in Georgia as Waco is in Texas. On his return to Texas after an absence of two years, he had been forcibly struck with the improvement that had been made in everything, but most especially in educational matters. He showed the great advantage which this institution is to the city socially, morally, and financially, and believed the moving to another town of this institution would be a material loss to the city, for it was even superior to factories in bringing to Waco material wealth.

The reports from Mr. J. D. Bell and Dr. F. T. Mitchell showed that the subscriptions at that time amounted to \$13,000. Dr. S. A. King, Dr. Thos. Moore, Dr. W. G. Connor, Mr. J. A. Solomon, Gen. Felix Robertson, Mr. Jas. I. Moore and Dr. J. M. Halsell made speeches to the point and with effect.

Messrs. Jas. Moore and Jno. T. Battle were appointed a committee to solicit to-day.
