Enter den Linden Strasse.
Under den Linden Strasse in Berlin is talked of all over the world, but it is by no means the handsomest or most attractive street in the world. In the first place, it is far too wide. For that reason, and because rows of trees are planted in the middle of the street, the view in certain parts is confined to one side. Nor are the buildings uniform in size and style. They include palaces, small shops, large and small private dwellings and third rate hotels, as well as hotels of the first class. Between the sidewalks there are a couple of driveways for vehicles, an equestrian road and a footpath—many features but none distinctive.

Then the street is not kept clean nor in good condition. Fallen leaves are allowed to lie and rot in the middle of the street. Under den Linden might be made attractive for a park thoroughfare, but for a principal avenue in the center of a city it can scarcely be considered fit or beautiful. Avenue de l'Opera in Paris, and Regent street, London, are both more attractive in almost every respect. And so is the deservedly famous Ring Strasse in Vienna. Indeed Broadway, New York, and Boulevard Anspach, in Brussels, although both much narrower, are both to be preferred to the highly praised Unter den Linden.—"M. P." in Home Journal.

To Seal an Envelope.
To seal a refractory envelope use the handle of your penknife instead of your fingers in pressing down the flap. The gum on many envelopes is of such an inferior quality that only after the most harrowing struggles can it be induced to adhere properly, but if there is any "stick" in it the additional leverage gained by the use of some hard substance like a knife handle will prove effective. Another advantage to be gained by following this suggestion is that all danger is removed of making those dirty streaks on the back of the envelope which are sure to result if the finger tips are soiled in the slightest degree.—The Writer.
