Arrest of W. J. Parks.

The case of Parks was reported in the NEWS, last evening. Five warrants were issued for his arrest and the officer was informed that he had declared he would not be taken alive. Taking the south bound Pacific yesterday afternoon officer Lockwood went to Lorena where he secured a horse and guide and made his way to Parks, house 7 miles away. Arrived at the house, the officer's eyes were met by a big piece of paper nailed on the door on which was written: "All persons are notified not to trespass in this yard. Don't any man come on this gallery." Jim looked at the notice dubiously and began to ponder if there might not be a trap gun concealed somewhere. He advanced however and found the house empty but out in the field he saw his man picking cotton. Walking up to him, the officer quietly notified him of his errand and Parks surrendered without objection, and was soon mounted and hurrying towards Lorena in the officer's company. At 7:30 he was in jail.

A Story of Florence.

He has retained his youthful exuberance of spirits, and though I saw him in "Handy Andy" nearly thirty years ago, I don't believe he would own to being over forty now. He keeps his rooms at the Fifth Avenue Hotel the year round, and when on the road he has the very best accommodations obtainable. He is a great wit and is fond of playing practical jokes. I could tell lots of jokes he has played and some of which he has been the victim, but I will content myself now with giving the latest exhibition of his wit that I have heard. Not long ago this barber died, and his associates in the shop went to the actor for a contribution to purchase a coffin to lay upon the dead shaver's coffin.

Feast of Lights.

With the setting of yesterday's sun the Chanukah festival (dedication of the temple by Judas Maccabee) was ushered with all its glorious memories and historical associations into the house of Israel. The feast of lights has always been an essentially home festival. Its educational capabilities are therefore unlimited. Each father of a Jewish family has excellent opportunities on each night of the festival (this festival is celebrated eight successive days, commencing the twenty-fifth of Kislew, corresponding with the twenty-ninth of November and terminating on the 3rd of Tebeth, corresponding with the 7th of December,) to inculcate into the minds of his offspring with permanent force the lessons of this feast of dedication; the significance of the heroic career of the Maccabees; the importance of the Judaism for which they fought, and the need of their successors to show the same valor in maintaining the religion which our ancestors transmitted to us. When the Syrian King Antiochus Epiphanes, who, it is said, was a great lover of money, soldiers and tyrannical laws, ventured to force, by military measures, his heathenish and idolatrous worship upon the Jewish nation, 164, the heroes of the so-called Maccabees rose against him, and defeated by a series of brilliant battles his daring and preposterous plans. These Maccabees consisted of the old father Matthias and his five sons, Jochanan, Simon, Judah, Eliezer and Jonathan. Old Matthias impressed upon his sons the great blessings of unity, and warning them against the fearful consequences of dissension, died at the outbreak of the hostilities, commanding in the last moments of his life his son Judah as commander-in-chief, and Simon as their adviser in matters of importance. In many fierce combats Judah slew several hostile armies, superior to his in number and experience, and was made by his wonderful exploits, master again of desolated Jerusalem; he cleansed the temple from the heathenish impurities and abominations, and dedicated again on the 25th of Kislew, (corresponding with the 29th of November) to the true worship of God.

This light of Judah Maccabee has shone through all the ages of the Jewish sad and checkered history, and will shine until that morning appears when the great Luminary will be visible, on which all human beings will consider themselves the children of one father, kept together by the closest attachment, and by the strongest ties of mutual good will, love and harmony.

WACO STATE FAIR.

A Scene of Beauty and Loveliness —Some Account of What may be Seen.

The Grand Opening and Waco State Fair given by the Waco Furniture company, at its extensive establishment, Nos. 521 and 523, Austin Avenue, was inaugurated under the most favorable auspices this morning. Discovery of Bethesda.

Biblical scholars will be interested in the discovery of the location of the pool of Bethesda. This body of water is spoken of by one evangelist, and that is John. In the fifth chapter of his gospel he says: "Now there is at Jerusalem by the sheep market (or gate) a pool which is called in the Hebrew tongue Bethesda, having five porches." The word translated "pool" in the authorized version, is given by some authorities as "swimming bath," and the phrase "pool by the sheep market" is possibly better rendered "sheep pool." Eusebius explains the occasional red color of the water to this "sheep pool" as being a trace of the carcasses of sheep washed in it before sacrifice; hence the name. There were, according to the evangelist, five porches or porticoes around the pool.

While excavating near the church of St. Anne, close to St. Stephen's gate, the pool of Bethesda has recently been discovered by Herr Conrad Schick. There is a courtyard to the northwest of the church which leads through a newly opened passage into another courtyard some fifty feet square. At the north of this latter courtyard there was at one time a small church. Beneath the floor of this sometime church are vaults, and through the floor of these vaults a cistern is reached, cut into the rock to a depth of thirty feet. The cistern is a portion of the original pool of Bethesda. There is still water in it, but is difficult to say whence it comes.—New York Telegram.
