Remarkable Abduction.
LOGANSPORT, Dec. 14.—A case of abduction as remarkable almost as that of Charlie Ross, has just come to light here through the discovery and identification of the lost child, now a grown man with a family. In 1863 a little boy, six years old, was missed from his home in Brooklyn. A vigilant search for days, weeks and months failed to reveal his whereabouts, and finally the almost heart broken mother gave up her little one as dead.
Shortly after the disappearance of this child a man appeared in Southern Indiana having in his charge half a dozen boys, ranging from six to twelve years of age, which he said he wanted to find situations or homes for. One of them who said his name was Charlie, was left with an old man named Allen, who lived near here. Allen treated the boy with cruelty, and he finally ran away. He was brought back, and as punishment Allen hung the boy by the neck in his barn.
The little fellow was rescued by a neighbor, and old Allen was sent to the penitentiary for attempted murder. Charlie grew to manhood, went to work for himself, and finally settled down and married. One day an old resident told the young man his name was not Allen, as he was called, but Lispenard, and that his home was Brooklyn. The young fellow consulted a lawyer, who wrote to Mr. Geo. Ryall, of Westport, near Brooklyn, detailing the circumstances.
Ryall, after weeks of investigation, found a man named Geo. W. Lispenard in a wholesale jewelry house in Brooklyn. This gentleman stated that he had a brother who disappeared when a child. Further inquiries developed the fact that Chas. Allen, of Logansport, Ind., was Charlie Lispenard, the boy who had been mourned for dead nearly twenty-five years.

Another Train Robbery.
NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 16.—A dispatch from Grenada, Miss., to the Pleayune says: Last night passenger train No. 2 on the Illinois Central road was robbed one mile north of Duck Hill. Two men boarded the engine and commanded Engineer A. J. Law to pass out fast and not stop until told to. The engineer and firemen, George Evans, both being covered with navy "sixes," obeyed the command and when one mile north of Duck Hill the train was stopped.
The engineer and fireman were ordered to dismount and this they promptly did. They were then marched to the express car. One of the robbers knocked on the door, which was opened by the messenger. After firing three shots a man entered and took \$3000, all there was in the car, from Messenger Hill.
The firing of the pistol and the stopping of the train attracted the attention of Conductor P. K. Wilkinson, who rushed out and was immediately fired upon. He returned to the train. Mr. Charles Hughes of Jackson, Tenn., then ran out with a Winchester rifle. As he stepped to the ground from the smoking car he was fired upon. One shot struck him in the left arm and another went through his stomach, inflicting a fatal wound. The death of the young man was very sad.

Strange Outrage in London.
A correspondent states that in North London a night or two ago a young girl, aged sixteen, who slept with an elder sister, was alarmed on waking up in the morning to miss her hair, which she had plaited before going to bed. A portion of the plait was lying on the pillow, with a piece of paper on which was written: "This is just to show you that I am about. The Barber." Strange to say, the room door was locked on the inside, but the window was wide open. There is no clue to the outrage, and both young women are very much alarmed at the occurrence.—Pall Mall Gazette.

Disappearance of Rev. J. V. Penn.
JACKSON, Dec. 15.—This community is greatly exercised over the mysterious disappearance of Rev. J. V. Penn, pastor in charge of the Methodist Church here. He has been missing for over a week, and fears are entertained that he has been foully dealt with. He was to have attended the conference at Vicksburg, but failed to put in an appearance, and his whereabouts, up to this hour, still remains a mystery.

Substitute for a Bullseye.
CLEBURNE, TEX., Dec. 15.—Latimer Shippe was in the shooting gallery today and went behind a target and moved the bullseye and peeped through, and as he was taking his eye away a shot was fired, going through the hole and striking Shippe in the mouth knocking out two upper teeth and splitting the tongue for an inch, making a very bad wound. He was taken in charge by Dr. Osborne who dressed the wound.

Killed By a Train.
BEAUMONT, TEX., Dec. 15.—Tonight at 6:30 Bon E. Davis, a moulder who had been at work in the foundry here, boarded the west bound train intending to steal a ride to Houston, but before the train had got out of the yard he fell between the cars and was instantly killed. His body was horribly mangled. The coroner's inquest developed the fact that he was from Chattanooga, Tenn., where his two children reside.

The Rangers Make two Arrests.
WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Dec. 15.—Captain McMurray, of the state rangers, accompanied by two other rangers, arrived in this city yesterday from Texline and received from the local authorities Mike Beal and Matt Nickles, who had been arrested on a telegram from Captain McMurray. The former is wanted at Texline to answer to the charge of theft of cattle. The latter will answer to two cases upon his return to Texline, viz: assault and robbery. Nickles was tried in this city a few hours before his departure for Texline for carrying a pistol and was acquitted. The officers and their prisoners left at 2:30 p. m. on the north bound train.

Unraveling of a Recent Tragedy.
ATLANTA, Dec. 15.—The guilt of the Covington tragedy has been fixed on Echols. He had been gambling until 3 a. m. with Cohen and Thomas. At daylight Thomas was found brained to death and Cohen unconscious. There was no doubt as to the murderer. To-day, after four weeks of unconsciousness, Cohen has recovered so as to tell his story. He says that Echols, having lost all his money, began the bloody work. Echols is in jail.
