# LOCAL NEWS.

## WOOL GROWERS' RESOLUTIONS

**Favor Protective Tariff and Good Wages for the Laboring Classes.**  
Whereas, the reduction of the tariff on wool by Congress threatens to endanger and cripple the wool growing interests, not only in Texas, but throughout the United States, therefore, be it resolved by the State Wool Growers' association of Texas, in convention now assembled:

1. That we recognize the tariff law taking effect July 1st, 1883, to be an unjust discrimination against the wool growers of the country and inimical to their interests.
2. That we urge upon, and demand, of our representatives in Congress to vote and employ their influence to repeal the said obnoxious law and to oppose any reduction of the tariff on wool.
3. That as wool growers we demand only such protection from foreign importation as will enable us to produce sufficient wool for home consumption as a nation.
4. That we will cordially co-operate with all other wool growers in the United States in every effort to secure these ends and protect our interests.
5. That we favor an early meeting of the National Woolgrowers' association for the purpose of securing a repeal of past legislation, an effectual revision of the tariff on wool, and the creation of a national association, that a more thorough organization of the wool growers of the United States be materially advanced, and we earnestly desire all State organizations to unite with us in their efforts.
6. That we regret the fact that our National Woolgrowers' association have not had that pecuniary support from the different State organizations, which it was entitled to. We consider that the effort of the wool growers' association, as a body, are entitled to our thanks for their efforts during the past 10 years in behalf of the wool growers of the different States, and we, the Texas Woolgrowers' association, hereby pledge ourselves to sustain the organization from this time on as long as it proves itself working in our interests.
7. That we favor the principle of good wages to our laboring classes, and denounce the system of the so-called "scab" labor, as practiced in foreign countries, and to this end ask a just and equitable protection.

## FLORESVILLE FACTS.

### Crop Prospects—The New Court House—Election Ordered—District Court.

Editor San Antonio Light.

FLORESVILLE, June 6, 1883.—Hain fell here a week ago to-day and also on the following Saturday, doing very little good toward crop prospects, which are not the best at present.

Farmers are now amusing themselves by growing at the weather.

A photographer's tent now adorns our plaza. At the next meeting of the Commissioners' court that body issued an order for the building of the much-talked-of new court house, to the value of \$200,000 for which the balance to be derived from the sale of real estate and the improvements thereon, which belongs to the county, will be appropriated to and the above property at public auction for cash.

The building committee are, County Commissioners, L. Wiley, Judge A. G. Pickett and W. C. Agnew.

The building is to be erected in the center of the plaza to be made of lumber with a rock course, to be 100 feet wide, 100 feet long, the lower story to be divided into offices and jury rooms, and the upper for court rooms. Part of the work has already been let on contract, and work will be pushed forward as fast as practicable, although there is an effort being made to delay the work.

Since writing the above I have learned that County Judge A. G. Pickett has ordered an election, to be held on July 9, 1883, to determine whether the county seat will be removed from Floreenville to Subterdahl Springs. ADIOS.
