TELEGRAPHIC NEWS BOILED DOWN.

DES MOINES, July 5.—The State Treasurer has just paid the last dollar of the State war debt. The State has no other indebtedness of any character not covered by funds now in the treasury.

MOBILE, July 6.—The bark Vega, from Vera Cruz, has anchored 15 miles off Mobile bar with the Captain, mate and all the crew but four down with yellow fever. She has been ordered to Ship Island quarantine.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The Anchor Line steamship, City of Rome, Captain Munroe, from Queenstown, June 28, anchored at Sandy Hook at 8 o'clock last night, making the passage from Fastnet in seven days, four hours and two minutes.

NEW YORK, July 6.—The hot wave increases the death rate. On July 4 the number of deaths were 150; on July 5 139; up to noon to-day 205. A large proportion of the victims are children under five years of age in crowded tenement districts.

PENSACOLA, July 6.—The board of health has issued a proclamation that all vessels from infected ports arriving here with yellow fever on board shall remain in the quarantine station until freed. The board regrets that the general Ship Island station for infected vessels has been closed.

OGDEN, July 6.—The incorporating building of the Utah Powder Works company, located at Ogden Canyon, exploded at about 5:30 this evening, blowing the building to atoms and instantly killing a man named Porter and injuring several other workmen. The charred remains of Porter were found with a board driven through the neck by the explosion.

HELENA, July 6.—News has been received from the North that the troops under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Ilges, of Fort Assiniboine, out on a scout to drive back the British Creeks, met the enemy this side of the line on Tuesday, and were defeated by the Indians, who greatly outnumbered the troops. No particulars of the engagement have been learned.

ALEXANDRIA, July 6.—During the 24 hours ending at 9 o'clock last evening there were 109 deaths from cholera at Diamietta and 68 at the Monsurah. The Lazaretta at Beyrout is crowded with fugitives from Egypt. Officers of the institution refuse to admit any more. One death occurred at Alexandria today. Ten deaths from cholera at Samanud yesterday.

CHICAGO, July 5.—Mary Smith, an assisted Irish immigrant, appeared in the County court to-day. She is violently insane and incoherent. Enough is learned about her, however, to show that she has been in this city only since Sunday, that she is without money, friends or acquaintances in America, and that she recently reached this country from Claire Morris, county Mayo. She is 70 years old.

ORSECO, Mich., July 6.—Alexander Perry, 50 years old, attempted to enter the house of Amos Bidwell, while the wife of the latter was alone. He had visited the house earlier in the day, but had left after making improper overtures to her. When he was observed approaching the second time he was warned by Mrs. Bidwell, and failing to observe her, she shot and killed him with a Winchester rifle.

ST. LOUIS, July 6.—As John Genhausen, a messenger of the German American bank, was making a collection at the Continental bank, 411 North Third street, between 1 and 2 o'clock this afternoon, he felt somebody take the wallet containing nearly \$2000 in money and several checks from his pocket. He immediately turned on the thief and closed with him, and after a quick and desperate struggle wrenched the wallet from him. The robber then broke and ran, and after a lively run down Third and up Locust street for two or three blocks, with young Genhausen in close pursuit, he escaped in the crowd and has not yet been captured.

GALVESTON, July 6.—The man reported yesterday as ill on board the bark Salome, recently from Vera Cruz, has since died of black vomit. The body was buried at sea. Another sailor on the same vessel is sick with, undoubtedly, yellow fever, and is expected to die to-night. The Salome is thoroughly isolated from the rest of the shipping here. It is thought that the Governor will take action to have her sent to Ship Island. It is reported that Dr. Swearingen came here from Austin to make a personal observation. In addition to the State quarantine, the city has established a picket boat to patrol the waters in the neighborhood of the quarantined vessel. A cordon has also been placed across the east end of the island.

A Novel Poker Game.
The Kansas City Journal tells of a game of poker played recently in that city between Major Drum and a Texan. The Journal says the Texan had no money, but plenty of cattle and an immense desire to play poker with the Major. The latter is known around the stock yards for his great natural resources, and he swept away the seemingly insurmountable difficulty by proposing a game of one-steer ante, two steers to come in and no limit. They played on that basis. Major Drum dealt and the gentleman from Texas anted one steer. Both came in and the game

opened with four steers on the table. Major Drum drew two tens and caught an unexpected full, while the gentleman from Texas caught a bob-tail snag and passed out. The third was a jack pot, and it took three deals to open it. The gentleman from Texas finally drew two jacks, and opened the pot with a fine breeding bull which counted six. Major Drum covered this with five steers and a two-year old heifer, and went him 12 cows better. The gentleman from Texas, who drew another jack, saw the 12 cows and went 50 steers and 22 year old heifers better. Major Drum looked at his hand and placed on the table six fine Alderley cows, five imported Durham bulls, 100 cross-fed two-year-olds, 50 prime to medium corn-fed Colorado half-breed steers, with a side bet of a Normandy gelding to cover the bar bill. The man from Texas made his bet good with an even 250 straight Kansas wintered half breeds, 10 Scotch polled cattle, 14 mustangs and the n. e. q. of the s. w. q. of section 10 of the Parkhallow of Texas, and called. Major Drum held three aces and put in his hip pocket 750 steers, heifers, etc., and a big stock ranch.
